

CITY DADS BAN FIRES UNTIL RAIN

Excessive Dryness Viewed As Menace—Dog Curb to Be Drawn for Passage—Property Owners Asked to Speed Improvement Requests—Garbage Complaints Received.

Effective at once the city council, because of the excessive dryness of things generally about the exterior of homes except the irrigated lawn and garden spots, with the sides of the buildings and roofs so dry that a spark on them might start a fire, last night voted that from now on until it rains no burning of rubbish in yards and alleys will be permitted.

This order will be strictly enforced and Chief Elliott at whose request the order was issued, will grant no further permits to burn trash or anything else about homes until rain comes. Heretofore fires have been permitted on home premises 20 feet away from any building.

Contrary to expectation last night's council meeting did not have much important business to transact. Public action was on routine matters.

In Executive Session

Other business was acted on at an executive session held immediately after the regular meeting was adjourned, the nature of which is not known.

However, among the routine matters considered was a decision to curb the dog nuisance all the year around, instead of only in the spring months in order to protect the gardens, as the city officials think there are too many dogs at large, not all of which are stray ones. Because of complaints, which have been received about dogs at large destroying flowers and proving an otherwise nuisance, the councilmen, offhand and with only a few words of discussion, instructed the city attorney to draw up an ordinance to be presented in the near future, providing that all dogs be kept on their home premises in leash or in enclosures all the year.

The council decided that the property owners of all streets who want improvement work done before winter sets in must have their petitions in for those improvements by October 1st. This decision was influenced by the desire not only that the work can be done before the rainy season comes, but to save time and money by grouping the advertising of all such improvements, and the fact that the sale of improvement bonds can be made more advantageously in one large bunch.

Resolutions were passed last night for grading, graveling and sewers for a number of streets, which were petitioned for some time ago.

Garbage Complaint

Upon Mayor Pines stating that he had received a number of complaints about the city garbage collection being irregular, and that something was wrong about the collections for weeks past of the City Sanitary Service, it was voted to make an investigation into the cause and have the matter rectified and this matter was referred for action to the council committee which has the garbage collection and disposal work in charge, of which P. M. Kershaw is chairman.

The streets and roads committee having approved the matter of construction of sidewalks on the east side of the city, north of Jackson street, the city superintendent and city attorney were instructed to take steps to have the work done.

Order Lumber Moved

The council also voted to have the unsightly pile of lumber at the Shaw service station on North Riverside about which the neighbors and citizens generally have complained, removed at once, and if the owner of the station does not voluntarily remove it, instructed City Superintendent Bennett to move it away.

It will be remembered that this lumber was hauled to the location months ago to build a structure, by the auto camp management, the construction of which was stopped on orders from the city council and city planning commission after neighbors had complained.

It was reported in the council last night that the management had left the unsightly pile of lumber there for "quite a while," the management saying it would either be removed or the city officials had stopped the work.

The council also passed a number of ordinances relating to individual properties.

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POLISH "COUNT" DROPS CHARGE AGAINST COPS

Adventurer Decides Will Leave the Country Without Pressing Claim That Money Stolen By California Officers.

NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Albert Sichelofsky, Polish adventurer and self-styled count, today gave up his battle against deportation from the United States and said he would drop the charges that thousands of dollars had been stolen from him by police and prison officials in California.

Sichelofsky announced this action through his attorney when he was denied freedom on bail to go to California to press his claims. Leon E. Spencer, assistant United States attorney, argued that an alien subject to deportation because of conviction of a crime involving moral turpitude was not eligible for bail.

Federal Judge Francis Gaiety agreed, but offered to direct that Sichelofsky be held at Ellis Island for two weeks to permit an investigation of his claim.

Sichelofsky's attorney, who had asked a three months' stay for his client, then withdrew the application for bail and said that Sichelofsky "would make a present of the money he has lost to those who stole it from him."
