FOOTBALL SQUAD PROMISES MERIT IS HAGEN'S VIEW

The high school football squad is rounding into shape rapidly and is not the hopeless aggregation it seemed when Coach Hagen started the second day of school. A dozen lettermen from the second string of last year, plus additions from the Junior high and the entrance of Silve, has brightened the prospect. The Southern Oregon conference team that leads the league will fix feet show more than last fall. Ashland and Klamath Falls are banking on veterans and already report that the district championships lies between them.

Silve is an open field runner, and passer. Zumburn is rapidly developing into a field goal kicker, something the state champions lack.

Coach Hagen has four tackles, Cunningham, Wingo, Lowry and Doolan. All are around six feet and weigh 175 pounds. The coach says that in another year Cunningham will be a better tackle than Bill Morgan ever dreamed of being, and that Silve will make the fans forget Benny Harrell as a halfback.

For guards, the team also has four, including Surrage and Green. Wenzel is getting his bearings at center, and has Cave as an understudy. Wenzel is a big boy, and gave a little fellow.

Coach Hagen admitted after last evening's practice, that the squad were showing signs of teamwork, and that the line was charging in unison.

He announced that a scrimmage would be held Friday evening. The high school football season will open in southern Oregon next Saturday. Grants Pass playing Crescent City at Grants Pass.

Ashland and Klamath Falls have games scheduled for the following Saturday. The first game for the Medford team will be Saturday, October 2, at Marshfield, a big team, that has played together for two years, is rated as a state championship contender.
