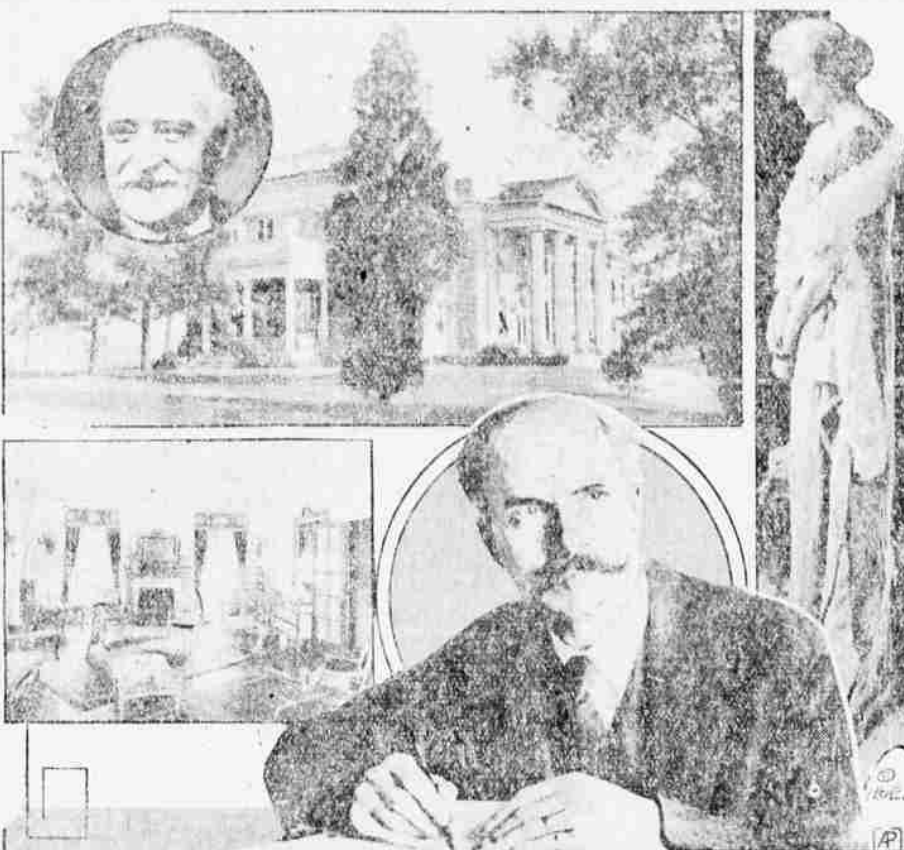

Washington Eagerly Awaits MacDonald Visit

LONDON, Sept. 18.—(Special.) Prime Minister MacDonald, according to present plans, will go directly to Washington, after landing in New York on Oct. 4, for conversations with President Hoover regarding the naval disarmament problem.

It was stated in well-informed quarters this afternoon that the prime minister probably will spend several days at the capital and will then go to Philadelphia on Oct. 7 to meet the doctors who attended him during his illness there on his last visit to the United States.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The proposed visit to America of Ramsay MacDonald, British prime minister, is causing a pleasant flurry over the usually gloomy surface of Washington's social sea.

Everyone is very circumspect about predicting just what will or might happen in the way of formal entertaining, an integral part of any official visit, and there is little precedent of recent years to serve as a criterion.

The projected visit, however, an event of unparalleled importance to official, diplomatic and social Washington, is a tea table topic of unflagging interest in the smart homes around Dupont circle and out Massachusetts avenue and Sixteenth street.

Sir Esmé Howard, British ambassador to the United States, who with Lady Isabella Howard, probably will be the MacDonald hosts, has leased for the summer a pretentious and beautiful country estate in Prince Georges county, Maryland, eight miles from Washington.

Mr. MacDonald may stay there, or he may make his home at the British embassy in Connecticut avenue. If his daughter Isabella accompanies him it is regarded as likely that the country estate—Langley Park—will be their residence.

The belief also has been expressed that President Hoover may have them in a White House guests.

Langley Park, owned by McCord, is famous in Washington society and diplomatic circles for its spacious gardens. The house, furnished on a grand scale, contains 30 rooms, and there are 500 acres of grounds.

The only recent event of comparable scope was the visit two years ago of Premier Mackenzie King of Canada, but his trip lacked the important official aspects of the projected MacDonald visit.

President Hoover, who undoubtedly will be a luncheon host to the prime minister, was a guest with Mr. King at the White House

luncheon for the former. Other guests were the secretaries of state and war; William R. Castle, the assistant secretary of state; Col. Blanton Winship, White House military aide, and Capt. Wilson Brown, White House naval aide.

There was tea virtually every afternoon for Mr. King.

As a rule there is only one social affair given by a private citizen for a visitor of Mr. MacDonald's importance. There is not even any speculation as to the Washington hostess who might get the honor on this occasion. Much, of course, will depend on Mr. MacDonald's wishes.

When Premier King was here he had luncheon one day with Senator Gerry of Rhode Island, who is a personal friend. Included in the guests at dinners given by the secretary of state and the British ambassador at that time were several senators and their wives as well as prominent Washington people.

Ben C. Sheldon Details History of Efforts for Highway System by County and Chamber Commerce

(Chapter 4)

Our chamber secured through the state highway engineer's office the preparation of the plates for a three color map of this section; the southern border of the map showed northern California, including Crescent City to the south-west, and the Modoc lava beds to the southeast. The eastern border of the map was some twenty or thirty miles eastward from Klamath Falls. The northern border skirted northward to Diamond Lake and Mt. Thielson; the west border was just west of our coast line.

Our chamber also secured from the Southern Pacific railroad company several very handsome photographic plates showing views of the Oregon Caves, Crater Lake, Klamath Lake, and our forest roads. These were sent from Portland to the Southern Pacific representative at Medford to be used by us in the preparation of a splendid three color folder to show this map above mentioned, and several photographic views.

Our plan was to produce the map as one order of 50,000 or 100,000 copies, and have them bought and distributed by the four cities of Ashland, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Medford.

The matter was presented to the Ashland chamber of commerce at a meeting of their board, and unqualifiedly endorsed. When this program was presented, with proofs of the map plates to the grants Pass chamber of commerce we were advised that the advertising allowance of their chamber had been allotted to other purposes, one of them being a very neat and attractive little map with Grants Pass in the center, prepared by Jack Harvey, secretary

of the Grants Pass chamber of commerce.

In this plan for the Southern Oregon Natural Attraction league, initiated and pushed by the Medford chamber of commerce, can be seen clearly the breadth of our Medford plan for road development.

I wish I had a proof of those map plates prepared in the state engineer's office at Salem, they would show better than any printed word that the plan of the Medford good roads development extended north of Diamond Lake, south and east of Klamath Falls, as far southwesterly as Crescent City, and included all the main highways in that entire territory.

No person conversant with the 15 or 20 year record of our Medford efforts toward the development of highways in southern Oregon can successfully deny my unqualified statement that that effort has, during all that time, been consistently and intelligently directed toward the upbuilding of all the highways leading into Jackson county from every direction and that they had as its fundamental the entirely selfish thought that only by developing the highways leading to Jackson county through all our surrounding counties could we expect, or would we receive our share of the rapidly growing tourist travel, the value of which is just beginning to be thoroughly felt and appreciated.

TWO MONTHS' RUN FOR DEHYDRATOR OPENS OCTOBER 1

Owned by the Rogue River people, but operated this year by the Rosenberg Brothers, Dried Fruit company of California, the Puckett system fruit dehydrator on North Central avenue will begin operations October 1, according to an announcement yesterday by W. B. Beelby, manager, who was in charge of the construction of the plant five years ago.

A run of more than two months is planned if sufficient fruit can be found to warrant operations. The company is in a position to purchase large quantities of apples and can use the entire output from all Medford packing houses. The top price will be paid, said Mr. Beelby, who indicated yesterday that the majority of the local fruit concerns have agreed to sell their culls to the dehydrator. However, he is anxious to purchase as much fruit as possible.

The dehydrator employs 59 women and 14 men and is capable of turning out a large amount of dried fruit daily. All apples under 2 1/2

inches are made into "chips," shipped away to be made into jellies and other by-products. Twelve cars of fruit, each car holding 200 pounds, can be dried every five hours in each of the two drying tunnels, from which the fruit is sent into the packing room, where it is placed in 50-pound boxes for shipment to outside markets.
