PERRY SAVED DAY FOR GEDDES HOST

No one can know the kindness of his fellow man until he has suffered semi-invalidism, says E. B. Carter, banker and well-beloved citizen of Ashland, Ore., who is registered at the Imperial hotel for a few days while the doctors look him over. Mr. Carter is an ex-speaker of the house of representatives of the state, ex-member of the fair board and ex-otter titles. Since 1919, however, he has suffered much ill health. "Speaking of a knowledge of local history," reminded Mr. Carter yesterday, "I recall the visit of the British ambassador, Mr. Geddes, to the west coast after the war. A caravan of us from southern Oregon went into California after him, and returning he rode in a car with Ben Sheldon, 'Smucke Pot' Perry, newspaper columnist of our parts, and myself. I never knew a man to ask so many questions as Mr. Geddes did. Well, we answered as best we could until he finally asked us in what year Oregon was admitted to the union. There was a long embarrassed silence, until 'Smucke Pot' Perry finally replied, in a very determined tone, 'Eighteen hundred and eighty-nine.' I couldn't get to him for quite a while but I finally did and said,

GRID GRADUATES TO REGISTER AT OREGON MONDAY

The Medford High school's contributions to the athletic forces of the University of Oregon started their trek to the campus today, and seven members of last year's state champion football team will report for the first Freshman football team next Monday. They are: William Morgan, tackle; John Hughes, guard; Bernard Hughes, center; Clifton Garbutt, backfield; Al Shuehl, tackle; Fred McDonald, end; and Clifford Moore, half-back. Morgan, Garbutt and McDonald were also members of last year's state champion basketball squad. The representation is the largest contingent of athletes in a body ever to register at the university from a southern Oregon high school. They followed Frank Callison, former Medford coach, to his new post as freshman coach. L. H. Gregory, in his sport column in the Portland Oregonian today, reports "Most of Medford's fine team" will register at the university. The first detachment of university students left today for Eugene. Most of the contingent were sophomores. Others will leave tomorrow and Sunday. Clyde Gilbert, former University of Missouri footballer, who has been working in the C. and E. packing plant, will leave September 23 for the university. He will not be eligible for football this season. Last year he was one of the stars of the Missouri valley conference.

CENTRAL POINT IS AGAINST AUTO BUS

The proposition of whether children residing more than a mile from the Central Point school should be transported by motor bus was defeated there this week by a vote of 30 to 18. The move was initiated by parents living along Beall Lane, approximately three miles from the school building. There would have been 60 children benefiting from the measure had it carried. The enrollment in the Central Point school this year has shown an increase of 10 per cent over last year. The high school today had an enrollment of 112, while the grammar school had an enrollment of over 250.

REPORT FOREST FIRE IN EVANS CREEK AREA

The first forest fire to be reported in Medford at the Crater National forest headquarters offices for the last two days was on state land on Mays creek in the Evans creek country about six miles northeast from Wimer, which report was received at 10:30 a. m. today, although the fire had been burning in brush and timber for several days past but had escaped discovery by the lookouts because of the dense forest smoke. Although District Fire Warden Dwight Phipps sent out a crew of five fighters, nothing was known as to the extent of the fire up to early this afternoon beyond that the first report phoned in was that it was a large one.

MANILA, Sept. 20.—(AP) The Philippine executive bureau reported today that 26 persons had perished in the typhoon which

struck the southern part of Luzon Island last Tuesday and Wednesday. The casualties referred to were on the islands of Catanduanes and Rapurap in Albay province. This week's storm apparently hit that section much harder than did the typhoon early in the month when some 200 persons perished in various parts of southern Luzon.
