

U. S. LUXURIES FIND MARKETS IN N. ZEALAND

Trade Commissioner Says Yankee Autos Are Liked for Hill Climbing Ability—Vacuum Cleaners Also Esteemed.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 20.—(AP)—United States trade advisers, speaking before the Pacific trade council here, declared that American trade with the world is "marching ahead" despite racial and religious differences and the influx which separate buyer and seller.

New Zealand, which Julian Foster, American trade commissioner to that country, declared had the greatest per capita wealth of any country, buys 90 per cent of its automobiles from the United States.

They prefer American-made cars, he said, because they are better, "hill climbers" than European cars. With the development of electric power, the New Zealanders are taking strongly to American vacuum cleaners and other electric appliances.

Although the country is now generally poverty stricken, C. R. Stanford, trade commissioner in India, told the delegates that they might do well to consider the trade possibilities of that country.

Living standards are being raised, he said, and because of the immense population, India may well be regarded as a vast potential outlet for American manufactured goods.

The present hydro-electric development in Italy will open new territory for the sale of electric equipment of all sorts.

M. Mitchell, United States commercial attaché in Italy, declared.

Mamuel S. Kusler, of the Philippine Government Commercial agency, reported a favorable revision in the commercial life of the islands with a correspondingly great demand for manufactured articles.

The United States, he said, was certain to retain its trade leadership in the islands.

LONG DROUGHT TO END AVERS WEATHER MAN

A partly cloudy condition today with the possibility of a north breeze this forenoon which will sweep much of the distasteful forest fire smoke, and the official forecast for general conditions for tonight and Saturday, and probably light rains, indicate an ending of the long drought that has been in this locality since the middle of June.

It has been 96 days up to today since Medford has seen rain. The last rainfall was on June 15 last, when .08 of an inch fell, and there was only a trace of rain on the two following days. Not even a trace of rain has fallen since, as the remainder of that month and July, August and this month up until early this afternoon was absolutely dry.

A number of orchardists were alarmed when the rumor spread this forenoon that a big storm was coming, and the cloudy condition and breeze seemed to give this some semblance of truth—as a storm would be apt to blow the leaves and apples from the trees and also interfere with picking of fruit and hauling it.

Therefore, it was with great relief that orchardists on investigation learned that there was no foundation for the rumor other than the forecast for probable light rains.

spreading of gravel over the road, which is now being used for the hauling of fruit, etc. A temporary bridge over Bear creek has been built. The approaches to the permanent bridge have been completed.

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RAIN LAYS LAST OF LA DEE FIRE

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 20.—(AP)—Just as forest fire fighters had completed dousing a five-mile trench to stem the slow advance of the LaDee district fire into 50 acres of forest land, rain fell on the west slope of Mount Hood today.

Thomas Carter, assistant superintendent of the Mount Hood forest, said the only threat of danger now lies in the possibility of a brisk east wind. No rain has yet fallen on the east slope of the mountain, he said, and the forest closing order will remain until there is sufficient precipitation to stamp out all signs of fire.

A new minor fire broke out late yesterday near Cherryville on the Mount Hood loop. Trespassers were blamed.

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TOMATOES PLENTIFUL IN PORTLAND MARKET PRICES AT LOW EBB

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 20.—(AP)—The usual Friday morning throng participated in the trading at the two East Side markets of the Gardeners' and Farmers' association.

Tomatoes were the most abundant, some sales being made as low as 25 cents. The best corn sold for 80 to 70 cents a bushel, cabbage was from 45 to 90 cents. French boxes of each apple brought 50 cents each. Bartlett pears were \$1.75 a box. Green beans went at 60 to 62 cents.

Spinnings sold at 75 to 80 cents. Lettuce \$1.00 a 125 crate. Eggplant 80 to 85 cents. Turnips 25 to 30 cents. Potatoes \$1.75 an orange box. Table cucumbers were held at 25 to 30 cents and pickling stock from 30 to 35 cents. Peaches from the Dalles had a wide price spread. Blackberries were 75 to 80 cents. Hales \$4.50 a 100, others 75 cents. Greenish apples brought \$1.25 to \$1.50.

The prices quoted represent an average value in some instances maybe above or below, according to size, quality and supply and demand.

Price movements on the New York Stock Exchange looked a definite trend today, but major speculative operations were again on the up-side. Weakness in some of the present industrial leaders tended to dampen bullish enthusiasm and while a score or more issues were pushed into new high ground, at least half a dozen, including Chrysler, sank to new low levels for the year.

The market turned heavy in the late afternoon trading with United States Steel and Radio Selling 7 and 9 points, respectively under yesterday's close. Radio at 35 was down nearly 20 points from its recent peak of 114 1/2. United Aircraft slumped 7 points and Oil Requirer was down 17. Total sales approximated 4,500,000 shares.

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
