FIND BODY OF HEIRESS IN SOLANO

Mystery of Disappearance Irene Wolfskill Intensified By Discovery of Decomposed Remains in Dry Creek Bed Near Home—Change in Apparel Puzzles Police.

FAIRFIELD, Cal., Sept. 20.—(Special)—Mystery which attended the disappearance two months ago of Miss Irene Wolfskill, Solano county heiress, was only intensified today with the finding of her body, badly decomposed, in a dry creek bed not far from her ranch. The body was found in overalls. When last seen, Miss Wolfskill wore a skirt and sweater and high heeled shoes. Shoes with low heels were discovered a few feet from the body.

The creek bed had been repeatedly searched by posers during the month's hunt that followed the heiress' disappearance and this fact, together with the apparent discrepancy in the clothing, led Sheriff John E. Thornton today to begin an investigation to determine whether Miss Wolfskill had met death by foul play or by natural causes.

The body was discovered by Bernard Glaschoff, son of a local rancher. The youth is expected to be the recipient of the \$500 reward offered by the Los Angeles bank in which the heiress had \$800,000 on deposit.

Thorough Search.

The discovery climaxed one of the most thorough searches in northern California. Since her disappearance on July 15, posers, under Solano county deputy sheriff, Indian trackers and private detectives tramped the hills and orchards in three counties for a trace of the missing woman.

Matt and Ney Wolfskill, brothers of the wealthy woman, aided in the hunt. Matt Wolfskill was of the opinion that his sister had fallen into a shallow pool in her wandering and drowned. Differences between the brothers impeded the search later.

Inquiry today was expected to reveal the identity of the person whose footsteps appear near the spot where the body was found. Sheriff Thornton declared he was "puzzled" how footprints of any persons other than those of Miss Wolfskill had been made, unless they belonged to someone who had dragged the woman to the creek bed after searchers had passed.

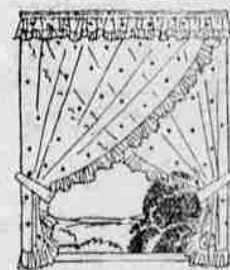
