The stage was complete except for rings and ministers and eustomons, but the routine of processionals and recessional was prescribed for practice so that there might be no hitch in the formalities of the wedding of the son of the former President and the daughter of Connecticut's Governor.

The White frame village Congregational church was opened for the rehearsal, and Professor William C. Hammond of Mount Holyoke College, who will play the wedding march, was on hand to play the music for the practice steps.

Cameras and news reel photographers were on hand to "shoot" the rehearsal and a large delegation of reporters also was present, engaging early the services of spokesmen for Mr. and Mrs. Trumbull and the young couple.

All four of whom have found it necessary to speak through proxies because of the pressure of the nuptial preparations.

Members of the wedding party already are assembling and will remain for the bridal festivities of the week-end and until after the ceremony. Many were from Mount Holyoke and Amherst Colleges, where as students, the girl and the young man began their romance.
