## CUP FINALS AT MEDFORD GOLF COURSE TODAY

Large Gallery Expected to See Finish of Most Successful Golf Tournament Ever Held in Medford — Larison and Tomy Favorites.

A telegram was received last night from Art Starbuck, air mail pilot stating that he would be unable to reach this city before Tuesday.

This means, according to Jack Hueston, golf club pro, that the finals in the President's cup match, will not be played with Larison until Tuesday.

The most successful golf tournament ever staged at the Medford club will close today when C. O. Larison plays Art Starbuck 36 holes for the President cup, and Earl Tomy plays Russ Simon for the silver cup in the second flight.

All golf fans, whether members of the Medford club or not, are invited to see these matches, and not only good golf but close golf is expected. The matches will be off at nine thirty and 2:30 P. M.

A large gallery is expected if the fair weather holds.

Yesterday in the semi-finals, as predicted in this paper Friday, Larison hit the hard hitting Conco official proved to be unbeatable. To shoot a 29 on the first time and come in three down is an unprecedented experience at the local club, but that is what happened to Clark yesterday. Only three strokes over par, but as before stated, if Larison holds his present stride, with his handicap of 22 it is going to take not a par, but a "birdie" golf to beat him. Clark was beaten on the 13th hole, six and five.

An amusing feature of the Clark Larison match was the fact that the latter's handicap was given by Clark, who is chairman of the tournament committee, so the loser could blame no one but himself. As a matter of fact, there is no one to blame. Larison is a comparatively new player who has never entered a local tournament before, so there was no record on which to base a handicap. He has developed rapidly, plays a cool, steady game, and if he wins the cup will be in every way entitled to his victory.

In Art Starbuck however, he is going to find a worthy foe. The air mail pilot is a tough hombre at anything, and when the going gets hardest, he is at his best. Only by playing 36 holes a day, two matches of 18, and winning them all has he been able to stay in the tournament. To play the match tomorrow he was forced to get a special dispensation from the air mail service so he could fly to Medford early this morning. He will have to give Larison 5 strokes, and the latter should win but all the golf fans are confident it will be a battle worth watching.

In the semi-finals for the consolation flight yesterday, Russ Semon as predicted won his match from R. W. Ruhl on the 17th hole two and one. It was a close battle, the winner having to give his opponent two strokes. Semon was one up at the end of the ninth, then lost two to be one down, won three to be two up, and there the match held until the 17th was halved.

Earl Tomy continuing the consistent golf he has played throughout the tournament, defeated Harry Rosenberg in the other bracket of the second flight on the 13th green, six and five. Tomy who gave his opponent 5 strokes was three up at the turn, then proceeded to shoot a birdie and two bars on the next three holes, to jump to six up in about 15 minutes. No one could beat that brand of golf.

The match between Semon and Tomy promises to be very close for Semon is shooting in the high 30's and gets nine strokes. If Tomy however, keeps up his present stride he should win.

## STATERS BEAT WILLAMETTE IN UNEVEN BATTLE

Rearcats Put Up Struggle Until Worn Out—Schissler Uses 34 Men in Opening Football Game of Oregon Season.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 21.—(AP)—The Willamette University Rearcats gave Oregon State heavy competition in the first half of the season's opener at Bell field here today and held the Beavers 7 to 6 but fell back before a fierce onslaught in the second half to lose by a 37 to 6 score.

Coach Paul Schissler pulled his entire first team after the first quarter and the Willamette grid-diers promptly put over a touchdown and held Oregon even until the regulars were returned in the second half to push across two touchdowns in the third period. Returned to the game again, the second stringers continued the march for three more touchdowns.

Schissler used a total of 34 players. Oregon State scored first late in the first quarter after getting the ball on its own 32-yard line. In five plays it drove to the 10-yard line, coupled with an off side penalty on themselves, Gilmore went over from the two yard line and Hughes converted.

Willamette's palliant drive from where a 17-yard pass, Erickson to French, several short gains thru the line and four Oregon State off-side penalties put it on the 15-yard line. Two yards through the line and then the Erickson-French pass combination put the ball over.

Erickson's try for point was blocked. Schissler's regulars started a drive in the third quarter, scoring when Sherwood went around end from the 15-yard line. A few minutes later a blocked punt gave the Staters the ball on Willamette's 40-yard line. Sherwood scoring soon after with a brilliant run on the 30-yard line. This speedy La Grande boy again scored at the end of the period with a short stab through the line. Kerr and Noshel of the second string counted in the final period after a succession of long runs by Owens and Montgomery as the Willamette line weakened.

Willamette fought bravely until worn down, making five first downs, two from scrimmage, two from penalties and one from pass. Englebreton outpunted Hughes of the Staters and Erickson was made at halfback. Oregon State made 14 first downs, one from pass, and only twice did Stater convert point from touchdown, one of the successful tries being lost by a penalty.

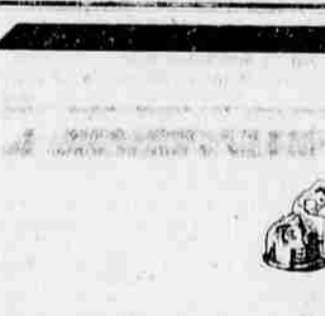
The football stars of the Medford high school, have all departed for the campus—all but Fred (Red) McDonald—for the University of Oregon. The cocky, but nevertheless sterling Red, after sending his credits to the University, entered Oregon State College. He wanted to be a horticulturist, and for a month has been torn between two fires. He wanted to be with his old teammates, and he wanted what Oregon State could give him in the way of horticultural education.

Mr. McDonald will probably get a horrible razing from his former playmates, but a six footer, who arose at 4 a. m. all last winter to wash autos in all kinds of weather to earn his way through high school, will be able to take care of himself. It is highly probable that Medford fans will see the Oregon Frosh team, under Coach Prink Callison, in action here, against an outside team, yet to be named. A game is under consideration with the Southern Oregon Normal school of Ashland. Of course, all the former Medford players will be in the line-up, or members of the squad. Saturday, October 19, and November 12, are open dates on the high school schedule.

Bill Moran, the husky tackle, left Saturday afternoon for Eugene, and Bernie Hughes, after a summer in the logging camps of Klamath county, returned yesterday, and will report at Eugene Monday. Al Stoehr will leave today for the university. Bill Bowman and Clifton Garnett left Friday.

Al Melvin, a bright star for three years of local football and basketball squad, picked three times as all-star forward, and a natural athlete, will not go to college this year. The high school football squad wound up the third week of practice Friday with a hot scrimmage. There is still two weeks of drill before their first game Saturday, October 5, with the Marshfield high school. The next fortnight will be devoted to the perfection of teamwork, and plays. The team is not as light, as green, or as inexperienced as reported, and while they may not be any "Black Tornadoes" for a couple of years, they will be a stiff breeze for the average southern Oregon conference football team.

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## STANFORD SHOWS CRUSHING ATTACK IN INITIAL TEST

STANFORD STADIUM, Calif., Sept. 21.—(AP)—Striking with the fury of a team in mid-season form, Stanford's Cardinals administered a crushing 45-0 defeat to the west coast Army squad today to roll up the curtain on the 1929 far-western football with a flourish unequalled in the memory of its followers.

With but a week's practice behind them, Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner's stalwarts ran riot thru the ranks of the service eleven. After two touchdowns counted in the first period, the second team displaced the regulars to roll up scores almost at will. Those who came to see the strong and heavy Army team hold Stanford to a low score, stayed to see a Warner-coached product play the best opening game in years. The second team, and reserves who followed, appeared to be nearly as strong as the opening varsity eleven.
