Judges Expected Attend Conclave Bar Association

That all the members of the state supreme court and practically all the circuit court judges in Oregon will be in Medford for the state convention opening here Friday morning for a two-day session, was a statement made today by Col. E. E. Kelly, president of the Southern Oregon Bar association. A. E. Reames, chairman of the local general committee in charge of the convention, met with the chairman of the various committees at the Hotel Medford this noon and reports were made on all the arrangements perfected up to date.

The scenic drive for the entertainment of the visitors, sponsored by the local Business and Professional Women's club, has been changed from Saturday morning, as was originally planned, to Friday morning at 7:30. A caravan of 40 cars will be on hand in front of the Hotel Medford and the lawyers and their wives will be taken on a specially planned drive through the valley. Taking in the golf course, the new airport, Tomlin's mill factory, the Owen-Oregon box factory, the orchards and historic Jacksonville, the interesting trip will take just a little over an hour, it is thought.

On Saturday morning another caravan in charge of Attorney E. J. The visitors will be served a buffet resort at the Gravelle resort on the way to the scenic point.
