About New York

"We feel that for the time being all the good news is out and that's that.
Word Twisters
Anagrams seem to be a pet diversion of metropolitan literary circles. Among the most persistent devotees of this ancient pastime have been the columnists and essayists. Alexander Woollcott is said to be the dean of local anagrammatists attached to the reconstruction of scrambled letters.
The vagie has even reached the book stage, with the appearance of "Show 'Em Up in Anagrams," by John James and Judith West. The identity of the authors is a mystery, but the trio is reported to be three wealthy financiers in the important world of letters, hiding their lighter efforts under pseudonyms.
The start of the anagram craze itself, however, is a matter of history. It is first recorded as having seized upon the royal court of Ptolemy Philadelphus, an Egyptian king, who was introduced to its possibilities by a visiting Greek poet, Lycophron.
From that auspicious beginning among the aristocrats the game grew in royal favor until the time of Charles IX of France. Charles and his mistress, Marie Touchet, conducted contests among the more clever courtiers for the national open championship.
The king's favorite of those employing his name was "Je charme tout," which translated means, "I charm everybody."
From France the pastime was introduced into England by another Charles—Charles James Stuart, who submitted as proof of his descent from the king of the Round Table the anagram, "Claims Arthur's seat." The anagrammatist who worked it out was rewarded even more richly than another who coined "The just master."
For the kings hired their anagram experts, one Thomas Dillon occupied that post at the court of Louis XIII of France. His salary was 1,200 livres a year and his rank was equal to that of the poet laureate.
The most prophetic anagram achieved by the royalists apparently was that of Mary Stuart, Queen of Scots. In Latin, her name was "Mariae Steuarta; Scotorum Regina." From this came the orac-
