REPORT TWO FIRES TO HEADQUARTERS

Two forest fires took place yesterday, one on Crater National Forest territory and the other on state land, and the origin of either fire is not known. Both broke out about 4 p. m.

The fire in Crater forest territory was in timber at Ginko creek, a fork of Mill creek and about eight miles from Prospect.
