BETTING ODDS ABOUT EVEN ON FIGHT TONIGHT

Conversation to Fore As Sharkey and Loughran Await Gong—Warm Spell Swells Box Receipts—Emanuel Injured.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Jack Sharkey, Boston heavyweight will have less than ten pounds advantage over Tommy Loughran, former light heavyweight champion, in their 15-round bout at the Yankee stadium tonight. Sharkey checked 196 pounds, at the weighing ceremonies at the stadium today. Loughran 186 1/2.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—(AP)—Jack Sharkey of Boston and Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia meet at the Yankee stadium tonight in a 15-round bout.

Barring disappointments of various kinds, the elections are scheduled to carry as far as Miami, where the victor may have an important part in deciding the heavyweight championship of the world this winter.

Neither fighter has been made an outstanding favorite among the voters. Opinions are greatly at variance with the odds about even.

The Sharkey backers freely predict that the talkative tar will bore into Loughran and end the battle before its scheduled time. The Philadelphia fans are confident that the former light-heavyweight champion will completely outbox his rival and perhaps do better with the punch that is said to have come with added size.

Conversation has been one of the most evident things in the preliminaries of the battle and some people have dared to say perhaps the pre-battle statements of the principals and the disputes of the fans are responsible for the wave of warm weather that has brought a great increase in the advance sale of tickets.

Today's box office predictions are that some 50,000 of the fight faithful will surround the ring when the fighters enter it at 7 o'clock, the light time, and that the receipts will be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$300,000.

Sharkey is expected to tip the boxing commission scales at about 195 pounds, while Loughran, bearing the greatest weight of his ring career, is about 180 pounds below that mark.

HOLLYWOOD IN HOMER SHOWER BITTER SERIES RELIEVES DULL WITH BAY CLUB DAY IN MAJORS

Stars Have One Game Margin After Defeat of Reds—Portland Ducks Hand Oaks 4 to 0 Whitewash—Mahaffey Hurls.

(By the Associated Press) Still one game ahead of the Fighting Mission Reds, Hollywood's Stars stood at the top of the Pacific coast league today, but faced a difficult schedule against the Bay City club for the remainder of the week.

A victory yesterday over the Mission club gave the Stars the league lead after the Reds had tied in the game the day before. Every battle in the present series has been a hard fought one between the two clubs, with the second half pennant believed to be at stake.

The Hollywood club won, 11 to 6 in the game at Escantron back here. Both Pilleto and Krane were on the mound for the Stars and between them they allowed the Stars 18 hits. Severed homed for the Stars and Boone and Scott hit for the circuit on the Mission side.

Staging a three run rally in the ninth inning, Los Angeles took the second game of the series from San Francisco by a 6 to 3 count on the southern lot. San Francisco took an early lead on two homers by Coleman and another by Suhr. Berger hit the other circuit wallop.

Portland blanked the Oakland Oaks, 4 to 0 in the northern city in a ball game featured by capable pitching, hard hitting, and fast fielding. Roy Mahaffey pitched his second straight victory for the Ducks in the week's series.

Sacramento took the second game of the series from Seattle, 7 to 2 on the latter's home lot. Kunz, former Sacramento hurler, defeated his former mates the day before, and yesterday, Bryan, former Indian pitcher, won the game for the visitors.

Death of Huggins Takes Zest From Games—Klein, O'Doul and Hurst Clear Baker Bowl Fence—Yanks Clinch 2nd Place.

(By the Associated Press) With the baseball world mourning the death of Miller Huggins, there was little zest to the games yesterday, and a home run shower at Baker Bowl was the most noteworthy happening. Chuck Klein hit two of these, and not only pulled up to within one of Melvin Ott and the National league record of 42, but also became the fourth National league player in 54 years to pass the 40 mark.

Frank O'Doul hit his 31st and Donald Hurst his 30th. Sigman, the Philadelphia recruit, and Herman of Brooklyn also cleared the fence. Bruce Arlica followed Klein's 40th in the ninth round of the first game, enabling the Phils to win by 10 to 9.

The second game was a Philadelphia victory by 8 to 5, pulling the Baker boys up to within half a game of the fifth-place Robins.

Johnny Frederick doubled in each game, running his string of doubles to 32, two more than the modern high mark set last year by Paul Waner of the Pirates. Ed Delebanty of the Phils made the all-time record of 66 two base hits in 1929.

The Giants defeated the Braves by 8 to 4 at the Polo grounds, climbing to within three games of the second-place Pirates. Each of these clubs will fall one contest short of its allotted 154, leaving the Giants only eight games in which to gain four, something of a task.

The Cardinals whitewashed the Reds by 8 to 0 in the remaining National league game, the Cubs and the Pirates having another open date on their schedule.

John Luzzetti's triple and Lou Gehrig's sacrifice fly enabled the Yankees to pull off the decision at Boston, 11 to 10, in the 11th inning. The Yankees were visibly affected by news of their manager's death, but pulled themselves together in time to earn the victory which clinched second place for them.

Glenn Myler's home run in the ninth enabled Cleveland to nose out Chicago by 9 to 7, and the Browns edged Detroit by 2 to 1 in remaining American league games. The Athletics and the Senators were idle.

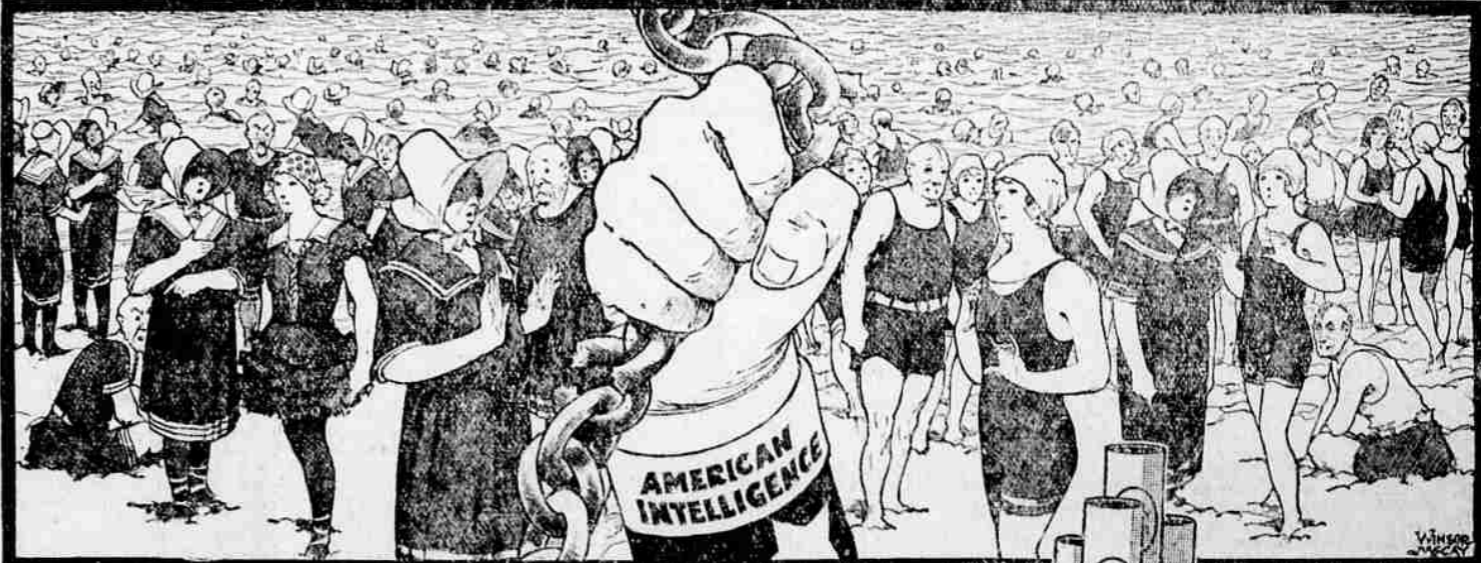
