MODERN HOTEL IN CENTRAL POINT ON SITE LANDMARK

CENTRAL POINT, Ore., Sept. 27.—(Special.)—After nearly half a century of existence the "Hotel Central" of Central Point has been closed to the public and will be torn down to make room for a smaller, but more up-to-date hotel. Work is to begin at once.

The present owners, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Chomel, who came here from Los Angeles about two years ago, purchased the hotel and spent a large amount of money improving the property, having the building thoroughly renovated, also a dining room and lunch counter service was operated in connection with it.

As a consequence of overuse and the health of Mr. Chomel was greatly impaired and under the circumstances compelled them to close their dining room service, and eventually to form their present plans.

The new hotel will be a one-story building with a gabled roof, and of about 15 rooms, all to be provided with hot and cold water and some of them with private bath. The grounds will be ornamented with lawn and shrubbery and if business justifies, cabins may be added to the property later on.

A small portion of the ground on the corner is already leased to another party, who has a business venture in mind, but is not ready to disclose his plans.

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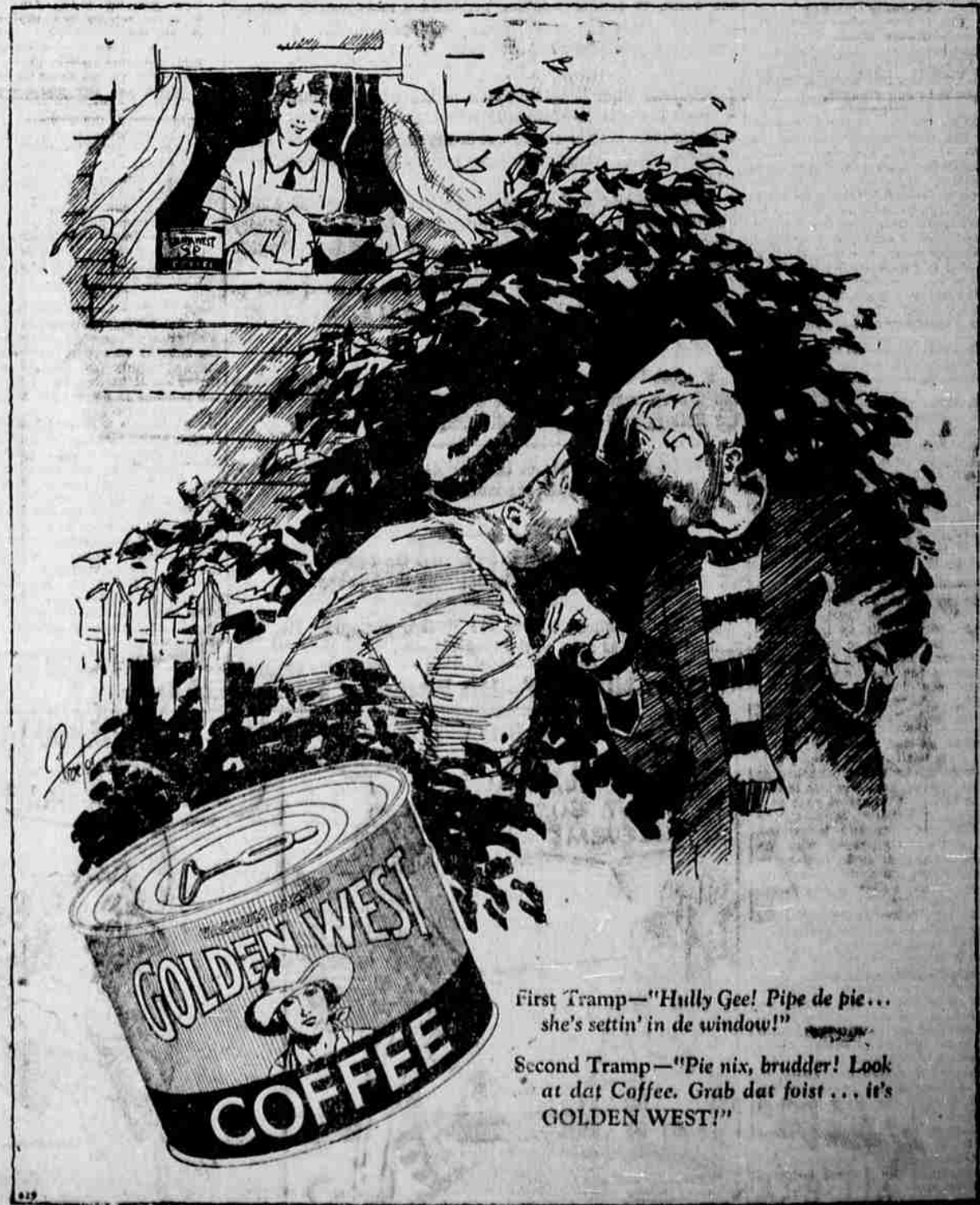
