

JACK PUTS BIG PUNCH IN PICTURE

Boston Sailor's Defeat of Loughran Renews Fans' Faith in Heavyweight Hopes—Third Round Debut Astonished Crowd of 45,000—First K. O. in Loughran's Career.

Receipts \$320,355
NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(AP)—A paid attendance of 45,000 fight fans saw Jack Sharkey stop Tommy Loughran at the Yankee stadium last night, the Madison Square Garden Corporation announced after a checkup today. The gross receipts were \$320,355, and the net receipts, after federal and state taxes had been deducted, \$254,621.

It was understood that Sharkey collected \$100,000 as his share of the gate while Loughran received 20 percent, or about \$40,000. In taxes on paid admissions and complimentary tickets, the federal government received \$51,497.50 and the state \$14,326.75.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Putting an end to persistent rumors that Tommy Loughran was dead, the former light heavyweight boxing champion who was stopped by Jack Sharkey at the Yankee stadium was located today eating a late breakfast at his hotel.

Although slightly marked about the nose by Sharkey's flint, Loughran said he felt as well as could be expected.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The Jack and Hyde of the heavyweights, Jack Sharkey, has put the big punch back in the picture, just as it seemed that there wasn't a man-sized wallop left in the ranks. The big Boston sailor exploded it last night, without the slightest warning, to accomplish the downfall of Tommy Loughran, a downcast crowd of approximately 45,000 spectators and restore himself to the top of the heavyweight brigade that has been battling so listlessly for the title left by Gene Tunney.

Sharkey, in the most convincing exhibition of speed and punching skill he has shown in more than two years, knocked out the Philadelphia boxer in the third round of a 15-round match at the Yankee stadium. In less than seven minutes of actual fighting, after 27 seconds of the third round had elapsed—Sharkey's unexpectedly vicious attack crushed the heavyweight hopes of the retired ruler of the 175-pound division.

Jack Forced Fight
Forcing the fight from the outset, Sharkey rushed Loughran to the ropes at the start of the third round, doubled him up with a left to the body, and then with the head and the chest, the started, smacking right uppercut to the jaw. Loughran arose at the count of five, more from instinct than anything else, staggering toward a neutral corner, his back to Sharkey as Referee Lou Magnolia stepped in to keep the rampant sailor from renewing his attack.

Unhesitatingly, Magnolia stopped the fight for Loughran, who on his feet, was in a complete daze, his arms hanging and helpless. It was a technical knockout but if ever a man was thoroughly out "on his feet," it was Tommy, too dazed to know what had happened; that his dreams of seeing the heavyweight lights had been completely shattered.

the boxer who had been picked by many to succeed Tunney and by most critics at least as "the man to beat" before any new king of the heavyweights is crowned. As a result Sharkey undoubtedly will star in the next and perhaps final heavyweight test, slated for Miami with Max Schmeling, the clouting German, as his probable foe, unless the Englishman, Phil Scott, has a reply to the challenge he made to the winner last night.

Landed First Blows
Only two real blows were landed in the first round of sparring, but both were by Sharkey. A left to the body and a hard right to the head. In the second round, the sailor took complete command, astonishing the crowd as well as the experts by the ease with which he outboxed the clever Philadelphia. Punishing him with well-timed blows to the head and body, after the one and only knockdown of the bout.

YANKEES ENTRAIN FOR FUNERAL OF MILLER HUGGINS

With the baseball world still mourning the death of Miller Jerome Huggins, action along the major league front again was more or less perfunctory yesterday in the two decisions reached in each circuit. A fifth game, involving the White Sox and the Indians at Cleveland, was postponed on account of rain.

Going into the battle for the first time since 1917 under leadership other than that of Miller Huggins, the Yankees pounded out a 10 to 3 victory over the Senators at Washington, and entrained early in the evening for New York to attend the funeral of their deceased pilot.

The champion Athletics had little difficulty in turning back the Red Sox in Boston by 5 to 3, far less than the score might indicate. George Earnshaw gave up just four hits in six innings, earning his 23rd victory, and then gave way to Rube Walberg, who permitted the Red Sox to bunch five drives for three runs in the eighth.

The game was uneventfully decided in the first inning when Al Simmons hit his 32nd home run with two mates aboard. By running his mark to 23 victories, Earnshaw broke a tie which had existed between himself and Pat Malone for the interleague leadership.

HEADLOCK KO'S CANTONWINE IN PORTLAND GO

Strangler Lewis Defeats Iowan in Spectacular Bout—Tackie Tactics Take First Fall for Cantonwine, 47 Minutes.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Portland wrestling fans witnessed one of the most sensational wrestling matches ever seen here last night when Ed (Strangler) Lewis, veteran ex-heavyweight champion, defeated Howard Cantonwine, Iowa, two falls out of three, before one of the largest crowds ever turned out for a wrestling bout.

It was Lewis' famous headlock that finally turned the trick after the former champion had succumbed in the first fall to the now equally famous tackle by which he lost his championship laurels to Gus Sonnenberg. But it was also through an attempt to repeat this feat that probably cost Cantonwine the match.

Cantonwine was plainly hurt from the effects of the headlocks and never left the ring during the rest period. He made a brave effort to stave off the inevitable, but Lewis took him for the third fall with another headlock in four minutes. The weights were 231 pounds for Lewis and 229 for Cantonwine.

FOOTBALL RULES TO BENEFIT PLAY

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REDS AND STARS TIED AGAIN FOR LEAD POSITION

Determined Fight in Coast League Results in Second Tie of Week—Big Thrill Comes in Last Frame With Circuit Blow.

The San Francisco Mission Reds and Hollywood Stars were tied today for the Pacific Coast league lead, the second time this week that such a situation has existed, giving proof of the determined manner in which the two clubs are fighting for the second half pennant, with barely ten days left of the 1929 season.

Hollywood's one-game lead was erased in yesterday's victory by the Reds, the score being 6 to 5. Recreation park here was crowded, as it has been at every game in this week's crucial series. The main thrill came in the ninth inning when Calum, pinch hitting for Carley, Hollywood center fielder, hit a home-run. The rally was short-lived.

Meanwhile, the Portland Ducks lunged to third place in the standings, having displaced the San Francisco Seals, who today were lagging behind Los Angeles in fifth place. Three Portland pitchers failed to stem the tide of runs in the game with Oakland yesterday, and Oakland won, 9 to 3. The Oaks crossed the plate eight times in the sixth inning and once in the fifth. Lombardi and Vergez clouted home-runs for Oakland, while Harris put one in the bleachers for the Ducks.

A home-run from the bat of Catcher Sandberg, which came in the eighth with the bases loaded, swung the pendulum of victory from the San Francisco Seals to the Angels again, the contest ending with the score 7 to 4. Five circuit swats marked the game.

Larry Gillick held the Indians in Seattle scoreless for Sacramento, until the sixth inning, when the northerners cracked out four hits to gain three runs and tie the score. Three more collected in the eighth won the game for the Indians, 6 to 5.
