

BUFF ORPHINGTON CROWNED QUEEN POULTRY EXHIBIT

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 27. — (AP) — Buff Orphington hen owned by Lloyd A. Lee, Salem, was judged the best bird in the poultry show at the Oregon state fair. The hen was awarded the championship in the English class, and a pullet of the same breed and owned by Lee was judged second best in the English class.

The best bird in the American class was a dark barred Rock cockerel, owned by Leroy Lawrence, Eugene. Second in the class went to a single-comb Rhode Island Red cockerel owned by J. B. Legett, Canby.

Championship and junior championships in the Asiatic class were awarded to a Light Brahma pullet and cockerel owned by F. H. Hogle, Sultan, Wash. In the Mediterranean class, the championship went to a Black Minorca cockerel, owned by O. R. Winters of Newburg, and the junior championship to a light brown Leghorn pullet entered by Fred A. Johnson, Tacoma.

J. B. Legett, Canby, had the five best cocks in the show, a group of single comb Rhode Island Reds. Second in the same class went to five black Minorca cocks, entered by O. R. Winters, Newburg.

ENDURERS FORCED TO LAND BY FOG

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 27. — (AP) — Fog so heavy that the refueling plane could not be seen, forced the Indianapolis Flamingo plane down at 5:40 o'clock this morning in its second attempt to establish a new refueling endurance record. The plane had been in the air 149 hours and 46 minutes.

Lieutenants Walter Peck and Lawrence Genaro hovered over their home airport all night, fighting rain, fog and a low-flying ceiling. Despite the murky weather, a contact with the refueling plane was made early this morning, but it was soon broken and the Flamingo received little gasoline. The fog became thicker and the two pilots decided to land.

WORST DROUGHT FOR LONDON IN 71 YEARS

LONDON, Eng., Sept. 27. — (AP) — London is experiencing the worst drought on record in 71 years, a 32-day lack of substantial rainfall cutting the dry period of the summer. The Lea river, supplying a considerable area of eastern and northeastern London, is beginning to fall, causing great anxiety.

Use of hoses or outside taps for sprinkling was stopped by the authorities several months ago.

Valgacion was found by a peasant who cut him down and turned over the body to the police. He is in a serious condition, unable to tell what led to the hanging.

DUST SCREEN AID TO BOOTLEGGERS

LANSING, Mich., Sept. 27. — (AP) — A "dust screen" that gives the same effect as a "smoke screen," is the latest device of automobile bootleggers, according to Oscar G. Olander, commissioner of public safety.

Favoring the less frequented gravel trunk lines or county dirt and gravel roads, Olander said, the bootleggers have equipped their cars with air compressing machines that stir up dust to the point where it is not only impossible to see the fleeing car but dangerous to pursue it and hold to curving roads.

Although the emission of heavy smoke from the exhaust of automobiles is punishable under state law, Olander said there is nothing on the statute books at present against "dust screens."

VETERANS WILL SEEK MORE HOSPITAL BEDS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Sept. 27. — (AP) — A plan that the government begin at once a building program that will provide hospital beds for all mentally disabled veterans is made in the report of the national rehabilitation committee of the American Legion, announced today by the Legion's headquarters, moved here temporarily from Indianapolis for the convention next week.

"There are at present 52,000 mentally afflicted world war veterans whose disabilities are connected with the service and for which they are now in receipt of compensation," says the report. "Yet less than one-fourth of these veterans—12,000—are now in veterans' hospital, receiving government care and treatment."

WEALTHY VISITOR SLAIN WOMAN'S APARTMENT

CHICAGO, Sept. 27. — (AP) — Charles M. Kieckhefer, 62, manufacturer, was found unconscious and probably fatally injured today in the South Side apartment of Mrs. Florence Jacobie, 37. His skull had been fractured by a blow from behind the ear. The woman, dazed with liquor and her dress stained with blood, was taken into custody.

An anonymous telephone report of "shooting" brought police to the place.

BOSS SHOULD BE A DRY EXAMPLE FOR EMPLOYEES

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 27. — (AP) — Dr. James A. Doran, federal commissioner of prohibition, today attacked as "inconsistent" business leaders who reward liquor drinking an evil for their employees but who feel the law should not interfere with their own drinking.

In an address prepared for delivery before the 50th annual convention here of the National Woman's Christian Temperance Union, Dr. Doran said it was encouraging to note that among those prominent in business there is a growing conviction that they have individual responsibility as leaders and that the laws should be respected and observed in good faith by all alike.

"It is my conviction, and that conviction is based on all the data that I can assemble, that our national prohibition policy is sound and will be maintained."

RECKLESS DRIVER WILL BE STUDIED

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27. — (AP) — A legislative interim committee today was preparing to meet in the near future to consider drastic laws to curb reckless automobile driving.

The committee consists of Senator Joe E. Dunne, chairman; Representative Wilbur Henderson, secretary; Senator Gus C. Moser and Representative E. W. Snell and Harvey Wells.

Recommendations will be submitted to the state legislature in January, 1931. Dunne said the committee will consider insuring the public of the financial responsibility of known reckless drivers. Such drivers, he said, would be required to file with the secretary of state a liability policy, surety bond or some other security to insure payment of claims against them.

ARAB BAND ATTACKS CHILDREN'S VILLAGE

JERUSALEM, Sept. 27. — (AP) — Arabs attacked the children's village in the Valley of Esdraelon last night while the children were asleep. Killed a Jewish guard and stole cattle.

Sixty-two exhibitors from Pacific coast states entered 487 rabbits in the show. Twelve years ago the show started with five rabbits; the next year there were 12 rabbits entered. Judge R. E. Osborn, Portland is in charge of the show here.

PARACHUTES SAVE ALL BUT ONE ARMY FLIER

MANILA, Sept. 27. — (AP) — Private W. L. McKernan was killed in the crash of an army bombing plane at Nichols field today, after the controls had jammed at an altitude of 300 feet.

Lieutenant Donald Phillips, pilot and two others jumped free as the machine started to fall and landed safely in parachutes. McKernan also jumped, but failed to clear the plane and was carried down with it. His nearest relative is Mrs. Mary McKernan, of Roslyn, Va.
