

EGGS HEADING TO WINTER VALUATION

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Eggs appear to be headed toward their winter value of levels. Top grades have advanced another 2 cents. The price to retailers is 16 and to wholesalers 14. Other grades were unchanged.

The Portland Produce Exchange has made no change in butter prices for some time. The product is firm at present quotations.

Corn and tomatoes, which recently had swamped the East Side market, were advancing.

Tomatoes ranged from 35 to 45 cents and corn from 80 to 90 cents a sack.

Hickling cucumbers are getting scarce, the choicest sizes going as high as 75 cents.

Turnips were firm at 50 and 60 cents. Bunch vegetables sold at 20 and 25 cents.

Bartlett pears brought \$1.75 and \$2.00.

Lima beans were quoted at 18c, lettuce at \$1.10, cauliflower at 75 and 85 cents, spinach at 75 and 90, peas at 6 and 6 1/2 cents; beans at 5 and 6 cents, celery at 65 and 80 cents, celery hearts at \$1.20 and \$1.25.

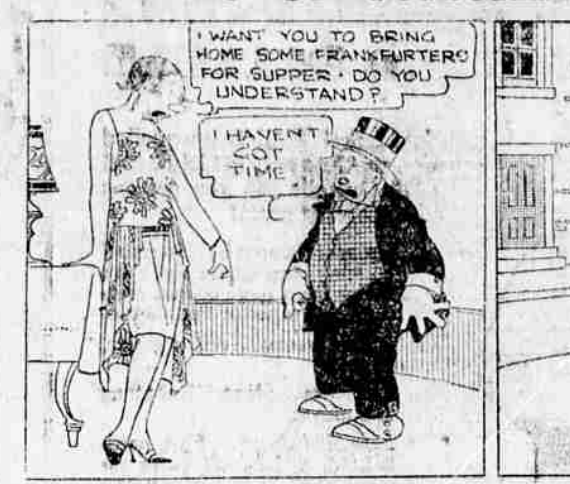

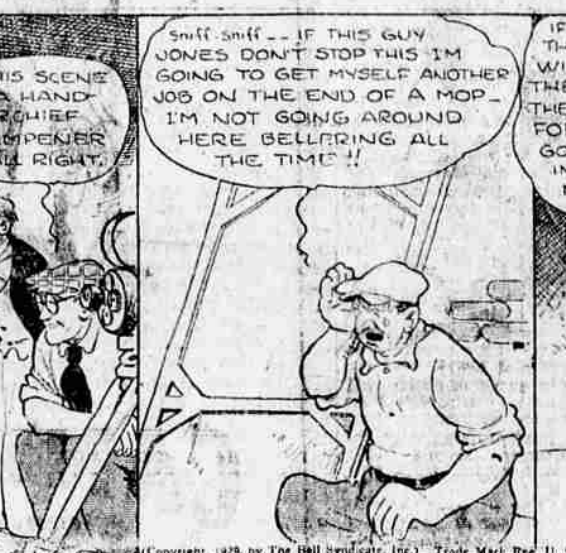

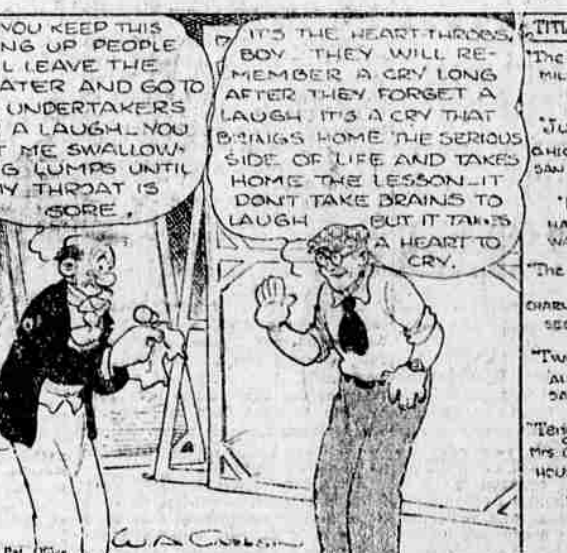

SAN FRANCISCO.—(AP)—Forty dollars worth of milk, properly concentrated, turned into a stream of gold for the San Francisco base ball club this year.

The Coast League club sold Vernon "Lefty" Gomez, star young left hander, to the New York Yankees in mid-season.

Behind the deal is a story of how the Seals officials fattened the 19-year old pitcher this spring. He reported underweight, a spindly, "lanky" with little stamina. His bosses sent him to the country where his principal chore was to drink half a dozen quarts of milk a day.

When he returned his weight was increased by 12 pounds and he had the strength that should go with the extra poundage. A brilliant record, including 12 successive victories, brought about his sale to the big league club in this, his first season in class AA ball. The sale price was not announced but is believed to be around \$20,000, plus two players.
