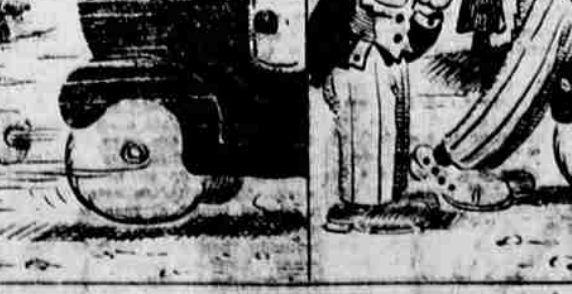

The best thing ever said about education was said by Jaures, killed in Paris at the beginning of the war, in an address to school teachers of France.

It is easy to teach children to read, not so easy to teach intelligent reading. Clemenceau has said "the individual may become like a god, but the crowd remains a herd of cattle."

It is true that exceptional individuals, under our system of education, may become partly educated.
