

MARIS TO REMEDY EGG GRADING LAW AVOID CONFUSION

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Because of the confusion which has prevailed in Portland egg grading, N. C. Maris has been assigned to remedy the situation by State Dairy and Food Commissioner Mickel. Either through intent or ignorance on the part of a few dealers, the public has often bought storage eggs which have borne the fresh egg label. At any rate, the practice was becoming so common that continual reports of it began to reach Mickel's office. Giving the dealers the benefit of the doubt much of the confusion has perhaps been due to the new law which recently went into effect. Eggs which have been known as "standard firsts" will hereafter be known only as "standards"; "fresh medium extras" will become "fresh mediums"; and "fresh medium firsts" will be known as "medium firsts." These grades signify storage eggs. Fresh eggs will be so labeled. The law will be enforced, says Mickel, to the point where penalties required under the law will be imposed for violations. There were no changes in egg or butter prices today.

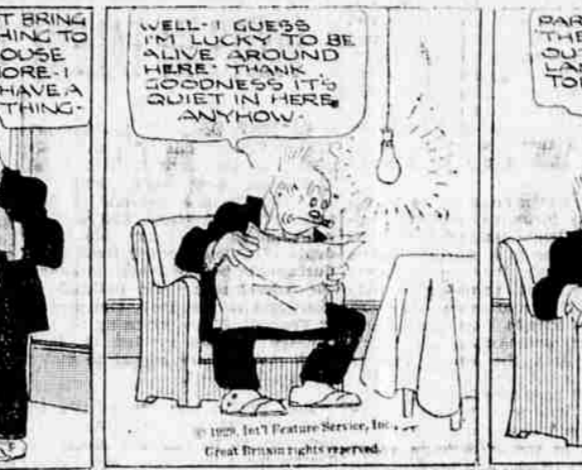
PORTLAND CATCHER IS SUED FOR AUTO CRASH

First of Season's Hunting Accidents Take Lives of Two

VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Richard Coverdale of Glynn, near here, was accidentally shot and instantly killed while hunting in the Sooke district of Vancouver Island by his brother, Lynn Coverdale, who mistook him for a deer. The brothers were members of a hunting party.
VENTURA, Cal., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Accidental discharge of his rifle resulted in the almost instant death of George Ber, a pioneer-Ojai Valley rancher. Ber had returned from a hunting trip when the gun dropped out of his car and went off, the charge striking the rancher in the chest.

PASTOR PERISHES IN ATTEMPT SAVE WIFE FROM WATER

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Dr. Charles E. Baskerville, for 19 years pastor of the First Presbyterian church here, lost his life yesterday while attempting to rescue his wife from drowning. After morning service the Baskervilles and Dr. Dwight Parish and wife of Vancouver took a lunch and went to Blue Rock Landing, three miles down the Columbia river, to enjoy a picnic. The two women were wading into a hole when Mrs. Baskerville stepped into a hole and plunged over her depth. The cries of the women attracted the men and Dr. Baskerville dashed to his wife's rescue. He was unable to render any assistance, but Dr. Parish finally succeeded in reaching the distressed woman and dragged her to safety. An effort was made to reach Dr. Baskerville, but he had disappeared after making the fatal plunge.
