The barber shop at Phoenix has been remodeled and repaired, which greatly improves the appearance. The work was done by Mr. Stewart.

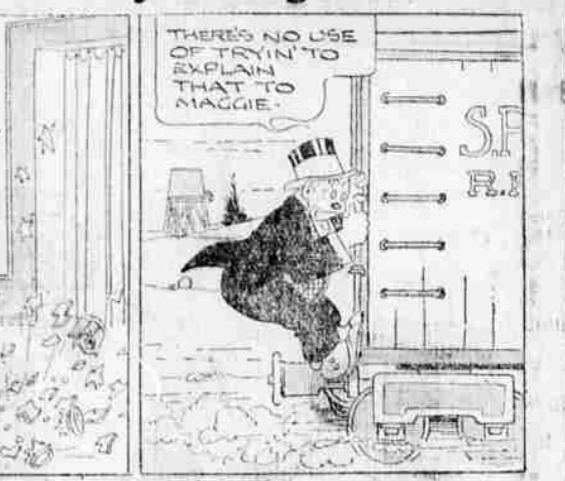
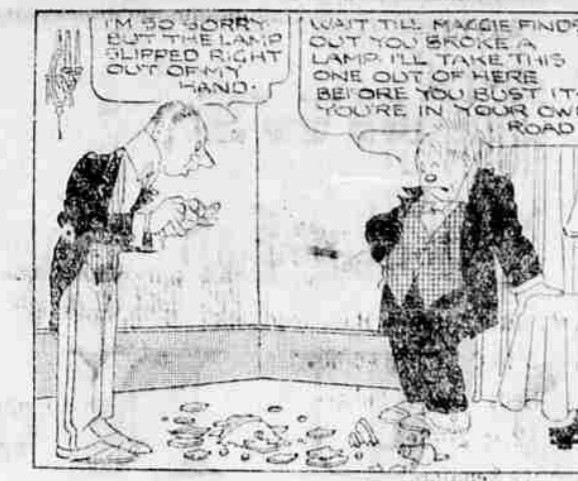
