Decrepit Old Dobbin Disowned When Usefulness Past; Is Local Nuisance

Poor old bags of bones, discarded by their owners and left to rot along the high roads, present a problem for Table Rock ranchers, and one rancher, Emmett Nealon, is particularly concerned over the matter and when in Medford two or three days ago was seeking the aid of the county commissioners for the fact that ranchers of the section have voted against loose stock running unattended. He was of the impression, following advice from legal sources, that the horse question is a problem directly concerning the constable of the district, in this case being George Prescott, whose district takes in the large area north of Medford and Central Point. However, the situation is thought to be of wider scope than the local officer could handle.

There are several of these horses in the Table Rock district, and they have proven to be quite a nuisance, said Mr. Nealon, adding that they are a particular nuisance because of the fact that ranchers of the section have voted against loose stock running unattended. He was of the impression, following advice from legal sources, that the horse question is a problem directly concerning the constable of the district, in this case being George Prescott, whose district takes in the large area north of Medford and Central Point. However, the situation is thought to be of wider scope than the local officer could handle.

Stray horses have been a thorn in the sides of Table Rock ranch owners for years and the animals are believed to be coming from the Beagle and Trail districts. Captain S. A. Tuttle took in several of the animals last winter, attempting to find the owners and was unsuccessful. Nobody wanted the broken down beasts and he fed them for months. None of them could do a day's work. Several years ago, by Charles Dunlap, and after trying to locate the owners for two weeks, he finally held an auction.
