

# BRUINS INFIELD COMBINATION IS RATED HIGHEST

### Double Play Data Shows Cubs Registered 160 Twin Putouts Against 115 for Athletics—Also Better With Bat.

By ALAN GOULD Associated Press Sports Editor NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—(P)—The last time the Athletics and Cubs met in the world series, 19 years ago, they presented two of the greatest infield combinations of all time.

Time has enhanced rather than dimmed the fame of Tinker-Evers-Chance double play trio and the famous Davis-Collins-Barry-Baker quartet of 1910.

Neither of the infields that take their positions at Wrigley field next Tuesday compare as a whole with those ancient arrays. From an individual standpoint, however, the Cubs have one of the greatest performers of all time in Rogers Hornsby, while the Athletics have a great youngster in Jimmy Foxx.

Frank Baker was the home-run hero of his day and Chance as slugger, but neither had anything like the batting punch of Hornsby and Foxx.

"If" the double play figures mean anything, the Cubs have a more effective combination, for they have registered over 160 twin killings as compared to around 115 for the Athletics. At bat the Cub infielders have an advantage of about 10 points to the man, with Foxx and Dykes, Hornsby and English topping their rivals by substantial margins.

**Fox Dangerous**  
Foxx is a much more dangerous batsman than Grimm, but the Cub captain is a consistent hitter, a more finished infielder and more experienced. Grimm was signed by Connie Mack when he was a kid of 17 back in 1916, but he never got a trial with the Athletics. This is his twelfth big league season and Fox's fifth.

Max Bishop, the slender Mack second baseman, has a habit of turning out to be a series hero, but his record cannot compare with that of his great rival, Hornsby. Bishop may be a better man at going back after pop flies but Hornsby has had a great year in the field as well as at the bat. His batting mark is 140 points better than Bishop's and his experience is a vital Cub asset.

Joe Boley, out of the game a good part of the season, is a smoother working shortstop than the 22-year-old Elwood English, but not so good a hitter. The versatile Jimmy Dykes, who can play any infield position acceptably, gives the Athletics a distinct edge at third base. Norman McMillan is fast and he has filled a spot that save the Cubs a lot of early worry but the ex-Yankee is not as seasoned or as dangerous a hitter as Dykes.

# University Yearling Squad to Include Only Medford Players Who Make Good Is Refutation of Callison Favoritism

The Eugene Guard of Tuesday comments as follows on the appearance of seven former Medford high school stars, for the first time, in the University of Oregon freshman team, under the direction of Frank Callison, former Medford coach:

Frank Callison, whose record for turning out winning football teams at Medford high is imposing, has attracted seven of the southern Oregon stars of his state champion team to Oregon this fall. Newspaper stories, commenting on this fact, have implied to some extent that the Oregon freshman team of 1929 would be a glorified Medford eleven. Perhaps it will, but if it does turn out that way the Medford men will have proved that they are the best to be had. To entertain an idea that Callison will play favorites in any sense of the word is folly.

The seven men from the Rogue River valley are Clifton Garnett, a deceptive open field runner; Bernard Hughes, a hard hitting center; Jack Hurbos, a hefty guard; Clifford Moore, a big, fast halfback; Bill Bowman, a rangy, steady end; Bill Morgan, a rugged tackle; and Al Stehr, a tackle that fills his position all the time.

All things high school are left behind on entering college with the exception of football and other athletic records. There are others for the yearling team that have good prep school records. Medford rates highest as a unit, but when individual ability comes to the front another aspirant walks off with the honors.
