JACK PLEASES CHICAGO FANS AS PROMOTER

CHICAGO, Oct. 3. — (AP) — The greatest gate attraction of ring history, Jack Dempsey, has sold himself to Chicago boxing fans as a promoter of fight entertainment.

Making his bow as a promoter last night, Dempsey, who never failed to give fans what they came to see, presented a card that sized with action. The historic Chicago Coliseum, scene of the old mauler's inaugural show, was not packed the way he used to pack them in, but 7,269 enthusiasts paid \$31,574 to see Jackie Fields, world welterweight champion, forced to use everything he had to win a 10-round decision over Vince Dundee of Baltimore, brother of the boxer from whom Fields won his title last August.

Two other 10-rounders provided almost as much excitement. Dave Sluade, ranked as the leading contender for the middleweight title, benefitted by superior experience and ring craft to gain a decision over Joe Roche, young San Francisco puncher, in the semi-final bout. The knockout element was provided by Hudson Hanson, Chicago middleweight slugger, who scored a technical knockout over Cowboy Dula of Ft. Worth, Tex., in the sixth round of their 10-round bout.

Divorces Old Alex. LINCOLN, Neb., Oct. 3. — (AP) — Mrs. Grover Cleveland Alexander obtained a divorce today from "Old Alex," veteran pitcher with St. Louis Cardinals. The suit was uncontested.

HORTICULTURAL MEET TO TALK PEAR PUBLICITY

World Wide Advertising Will Be Subject at Annual Session of Pacific Coast Fruit Men Here November 13 to 15.

World-wide advertising of the pears of the three Pacific coast states will be one of the chief subjects discussed at the annual meeting of the Oregon Horticultural Association to be held in this city November 13, 14, and 15. It was announced at the meeting of the Rogue River Traffic association this noon.

Representatives of the leading pear growing districts of Oregon, Washington and California will be in attendance.

The meeting will be in charge of Prof. Clayton Long of Oregon State college.

Leading horticulturists of the Pacific coast will deliver addresses at the session.

The Traffic association committee composed of President David Rosenberg and Secretary C. I. Baker, were named to assist in the preliminary details.

More than 100 invitations have been issued to northwest fruitmen to attend the session and it promises to be the largest meeting in the history of the association.

President Rosenberg said that the meeting would assume the aspects of a western pear conference.

Prblems of the soil and the orchard will also be discussed at the session.

James E. Edmiston, chairman of the Traffic committee, reported that no word has been received from the Southern Pacific agent the local price for a 2 1/2 cent export fruit freight rate between this city and Portland, and San Francisco. Chairman Edmiston expressed doubt that any action would be taken in time for benefits to be received this year.

The naming of a legislative committee to work for changes

beneficial to the fruit industry was favored, and taken under consideration. Exemption of women workers in perishable fruit, from the eight hour law, was named as a matter for consideration.

Guy Corner presented an estimate of the fruit shipments from this section for the season as follows: Eastern shipments 2153; Cannery shipments 691; Cars in storage 465; Cars unpecked 220.

CRATER FOREST HAS ONLY FIRE OREGON TIMBER

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 3. — (AP) — A forest fire of incendiary origin, which spread over 100 acres in the Crater national forest, near Hall's Point, was reported today to Major John Guthrie, assistant district United States forester, who said the fire was the only one in the state.

Two sections of the Cascade national forest were closed to hunters and tourists in order of the district forest office because of arid conditions. The Winberry and Westfir sections will remain closed until after heavy rains.

Compared with last year, up to October 1, this season has been disastrous, according to the district forest office. A total of more than 200,000 acres has been burned over in the national forests of Washington and Oregon.

It was learned here today at the Crater National forest offices that the above mentioned fire, on which 26 fire fighters had been working for several days, was practically out at 9 this morning, after having been brought under control last evening, and that the majority of the men were being withdrawn to their respective camps, leaving only enough men at the fire camp to patrol it.
