LOIS MORAN IS REAL STAR IN BEHIND CURTAIN

The words "Wain softly, go far," and the remembrance of their utterance by the Scotland yard detective in his magnetic and deep resonant voice and impressive manner, and which seemed to be a sort of verbal theme song with him throughout the play, still pleasantly ring in the ears of the audience after witnessing "Behind the Curtain," the superb talking mystery melodrama which opened at Hunt's Craterian theater yesterday to run until Sunday.

"Behind That Curtain" in its elements of general excellence of entertainment, appeal, all-around speaking and sound, splendid direction and scenic beauty and lack of cheap horse play is the best of the mystery talking pictures ever seen here, in the opinion of the writer.

Its artistic entertainment value is illustrated by the fact that this moving picture was chosen to open the new \$5,000,000 Fox theater in San Francisco recently.

The good dramatic work and pleasing personality shown by the three stars, Warner Baxter, Lois Moran and Gilbert Emery, the latter as the Scotland yard detective, with their pleasing and well modulated voices and repression would make this attraction stand out in the screen world, but the supporting cast is of corresponding ability, and the play's other qualities make it moving picture entertainment far above the average.

The lines and dialogue are not exceptional, but the audience fairly revels in those modulated voices and convincing repression of the principals and subordinate characters, as the absorbing mystery story with its many thrills, touches of humor and glimpses of foreign life and people is worked out.

The tall and physically attractive Emery, with his matchless voice and repressed manner, almost outshines the work of those other two favorite actors, Lois Moran and Warner Baxter, famed as they are for their voices and dramatic ability. Baxter does not have as prominent a role as he had in "The Old Arizona," but is very pleasing. Miss Moran shines out as a versatile actress and her emotional sequences are convincing. The two make an unusually attractive pair of lovers.

The minor character bits of "Behind That Curtain" are also artistic.

The story tells of the secret marriage of an English heiress, Lois Moran, to an unworthy man, who is later found to be a murderer. The story is a thrilling one, and the audience is kept in suspense throughout.

The story opens in London, moves from an English manor to the colorful city and then to India and then to San Francisco, hence the exceptional scenic views in the picture.

Sound news review, a historic monologue and a short talking comedy are also on the program.

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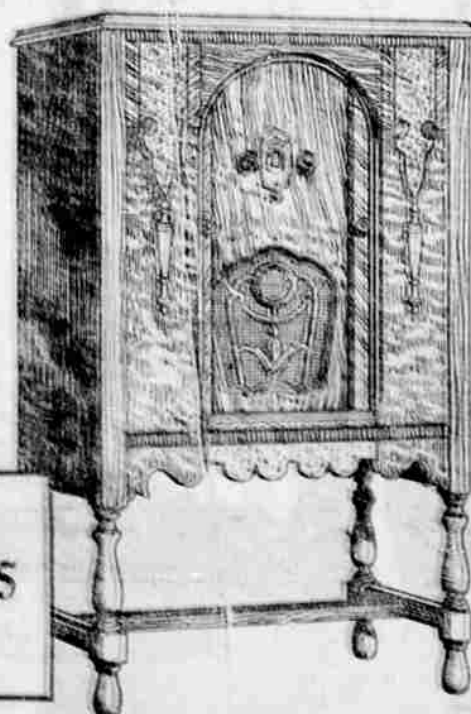
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
