

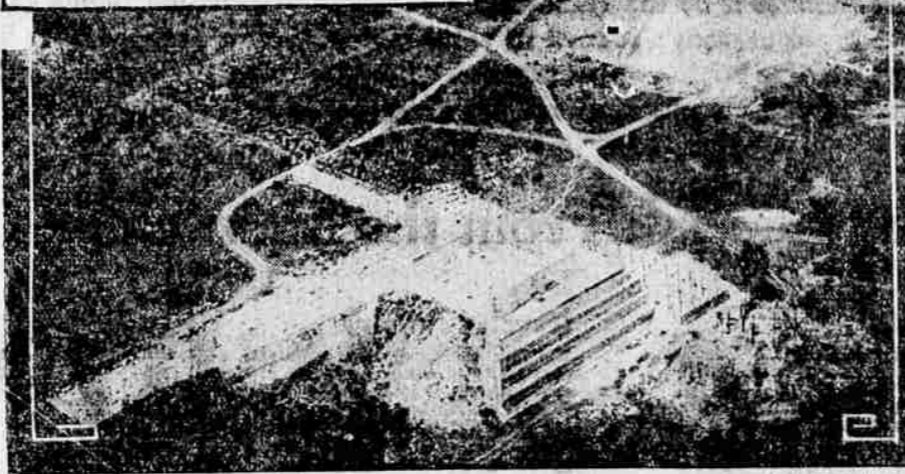
GRANTS PASS WOMAN AIDS CROOK CAPTURE

LINDBERGH TO EXPLORE OBSCURE MAYAN RUINS

AMERICA'S LATEST AND LARGEST LAND PLANE

FOKKER FIELD, Hasbrouck Heights, N. J., Sept. 29.—America's greatest airplane—the 32-place Fokker F-32—the largest landplane in the world, surprised aviation experts and delighted its designers in its first public test here. This latest creation of the Fokker Aircraft Corporation of America, now affiliated with the General Motors Corporation, carries 30 passengers in day flights and sleeps 14 in luxurious comfort in transcontinental night flights. Five of the great new ships, costing \$110,000 each, have already been ordered by Universal Aviation Corporation for use in its transcontinental services. The huge ship, which has a span of 89 feet, is 65 feet 10 inches long and 14 feet high, was designed for a top speed of 140 miles per hour, a cruising speed of 120 miles per hour and a landing speed of 60 miles per hour. In every particular the F-32 surpassed the performance for which it was designed. Flying at full throttle, the F-32 made 157 miles per hour air speed. The ship cruised at between 120 and 125 miles per hour and was set down to 47 miles per hour. A drizzling rain was falling when the ship took off for the first time and throughout its trial flights. A heavy fog surrounded the field and visibility ended at a quarter mile. An enthusiastic group of aviation writers, technical experts and aviation officials watched the tests, including Anthony H. G. Fokker, Captain E. V. Rickenbacker, vice president in charge of sales, W. T. Whalen, vice president and general manager and A. A. Gassner, chief engineer of Fokker company. The F-32 also operated on its two-stroke motor alone, and on its two port motors alone, and was able to turn with or against the motors. With a two-thrust load, it was able to hold its flying speed and even gain altitude on one motor alone. It is powered with four 525 horsepower Pratt & Whitney "Hornet" engines, has a rate of climb of 1,200 feet the first minute, and a service ceiling of 18,000 feet. Weight of the plane empty is 13,000 pounds, has a total useful load of 8,700 pounds, giving it a gross weight of 22,500 pounds, or 11 1/2 tons, carries 400 gallons of fuel, 40 gallons of oil, a crew of pilot, co-pilot, radio operator and steward, and 30 passengers in day time flying, with provision for 500 pounds of baggage. As a night plane, it carries 700 gallons of fuel, 60 gallons of oil.

a crew of five, 16 passengers and \$20 pounds of baggage. Its spacious cabin is divided into four sections each of which has four glass windows, is fitted with 30 comfortable armchairs, two fully equipped lavatories, two galleys, or serving pantries, amidships, and a baggage compartment forward.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 4.—(AP)—A new radio chain, with headquarters in Seattle, and connecting links in San Francisco, Portland, Los Angeles and other leading Pacific coast cities, has been formed, according to the announcement of Charles M. Thomsen, vice-president of the Pacific Coast Music company.

ORDER PROBE SALES BY SHIPPING BOARD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—(AP)—President Hoover has requested the attorney general to investigate the reports of Comptroller General McCarr on the shipping board's sale of vessels, through which McCarr claimed millions of dollars had been lost. The president said he understood the report was on transactions prior to this administration and that there was no charge of misfeasance.

CADETS LOCK WINGS IN MIDAIR; ONE DEAD

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Cadet George W. Peddicord, 23, of Spokane, Wash., flying in a practice aerial formation at the United States army airport, March field, near here today, in preparation for his graduation next week, locked his ship with another in mid-air and fell to his death. Peddicord's parents live in Spokane. The pilot, Cadet P. B. Balfour, leaped to safety with a parachute, but for an unknown reason, Peddicord did not use his parachute.

MAY HANDLE CURRENT CROP IN CORPORATION

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—(AP)—The proposed \$20,000,000 Farmers' National Grain corporation will be in a position to start operations at an early date and it was believed some of this year's grain crop might be handled by the new concern, said a joint statement issued by the federal farm board and the cooperative organization subcommittee today. For use on a lightweight high-speed outboard motor recently placed on the market, there is provided an auxiliary plunger pump which can be quickly attached and provides a steady stream of water for cooling the cylinders at slowest trolling speeds.

Release Hit-Run Autos. PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 4.—(AP)—Frederick Wolf, 24, Portland, was at liberty today under \$1000 bail after his arrest yesterday as a suspect of being the hit and run motorist who injured Albert Bruegger, 33, Portland.
