# TONIGHT'S BATTLE IMPORTANT EVENT IN GENE'S CAREER

Boxing fans from all parts of southern Oregon are expected to be present tonight at Medford's first smoker of the season, presenting Gene O'Grady of Ashland against Benny Hill of San Francisco, in a 19-round main event, preceded by a fast semi-windup and three four-round bouts. The curtain raiser will begin promptly at 8:45 and each bout will follow in rapid order, according to carefully made plans of Promoter Joe Bickerstaff of Klamath Falls.

If O'Grady can get by Hill without defeat, the Ashland boy will probably leave in a short time on a tour of California cities, meeting the best men of his weight in that state. Along with the other fighters, he arrived in Medford today and was spending the day resting. Benny Hill, rated high in the Pacific Coast boxing world, declares he is in perfect shape and has never felt better for any bout. Hill gets the high-powered guarantee of \$400 for fighting in Medford and is the most expensive fighter to have donned the gloves in a local ring for many years.

The semi-windup promises to be as fast as the main event, with Johnny Spencer, 136 pounds, of Seattle, meeting Jack Davlos, 136 of Clifton. Spencer is known as the Seattle school boy marvel and has met success in most of his bouts. If he wins tonight, he is slated to meet Joe Marcus, coast champion in a bout either here or at Klamath Falls. The three four-round events will all present fast fighters.

In a special event, Steamboat Jackson of Klamath Falls will attempt to win his seventh straight fight by defeating Billy Huff, O'Grady's Indian trainer. A four-round heavy-weight mix-up will have Tiny McMember of Daisy matched against Battling Bunker of Dorris. The curtain raiser will present Milling Miller of Marshfield against Hurricane Harry of Clifton.

# FIRST DIVISIONAL OF COAST LEAGUE DIVIDE WINNINGS

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 8.—(AP) While other first division clubs of the Pacific Coast League divided the swag of the 1929 season, the Hollywood Stars, winners of the second half of the season, and the Mission Reds of this bay city, winners of the first half, took up their baggages and mitts today to begin a seven game series for this year's league championship.

Had the Reds won the last half, a playoff for the pennant would have been unnecessary. As it is, the Stars and the Reds must decide between them which is the better team. They will play a three game series at Recreation park here, and then will proceed to Wrigley Field, Los Angeles, where three more games will be disposed of. The seventh game will be played in a site as yet undesignated.

President Williams at Los Angeles has mailed a check for \$2000 to the San Francisco Reds who won their money, and check for \$1200 to the Oakland club for fourth place. The Los Angeles club was given a check for \$800 as fifth money. Division of the prize money was determined by standing of the full season.

Meanwhile, \$6000 was drawn for the two half season winners, and this will be divided on a 40-40 basis after the championship is decided.

# Modest Maulers May Steal Show in Current Classic

Special Editor Associated Press Feature Service. NEW YORK—(AP)—Two solemn visaged, soft-spoken young players who leave it to their bats to do their "talking" stand out as prospective stars in the current world's series.

They are Riggs Stephenson of the Cubs and Jimmy Foxx of the Athletics.

As talkers they bat about zero, but when it comes to swinging the willow they check in with ratings of around 360.

Since both teams have their prima donnas and their "jockeys," it's results with the bat in the series contestants decide from Riggs and Jimmy.

And judging from their usual stinging pace they will be able to take care of their own hit production as well as that of one or two teammates, perhaps.

This pair of tight-lipped clouters have been the very backbone of the batting attacks of the two pennant winners. Foxx has been hovering around the top of the league in batting since the 1929 campaign opened.

He was out in front most of the season and was doing his heaviest hitting when it was needed, when such clubs as the Yankees needed some good, sound slugging to keep them suppressed.

Jimmy ended up during the closing days of the season and his average dropped from around .399 to .358 in the vicinity of the .500 mark.

They call Stephenson "Old Hoss" Stephenson. That old plugging style that has been getting the batting and run-producing results for the Cubs for the last four years has made J. Riggs one of the most feared of big league batters of the age.

"Old Hoss" is one of those gems Joe McCarthy spotted in his managerial days in the American association. J. Riggs rewarded the

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# CRAFTY CONNIE BACK TO RENEW FEUD WITH CUBS

### Athletics' Taciturn Leader Invades Chicago for World Series Battle After 19 Years—Few Survivors of Old Days.

Associated Press Sports Writer CHICAGO, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Connie Mack, a bit grayer, as lean as ever, younger, and even more taciturn, today came back to Chicago after 19 years to take up a baseball quarrel with the Cubs where he left it in 1910. On his second world's series visit the manager of Philadelphia's Athletics brought a new club with one exception, only Eddie Collins surviving the challenge of the years. Today he found a lot of strange Cubs to oppose his invasion of the west.

When Connie Mack last led his white elephants into the stronghold of the Cubs, Joe McCarthy, the pleasant visaged manager of the current edition of the Chicago Nationals was a young man of 22, playing utility roles in the minors. For that matter, the crafty Connie was then a mere strapping of 48.

On his renewal of the ancient baseball feud, the 67 year old leader of the A's finds former worthy of his steel. Then he was able to subdue the Cubs in "four out of five." Today there are many willing to suggest, and support their convictions with their money that this series will be in full force after five games have been played.

Although the Athletics entered the series slight favorites there seems at the last minute little to choose between them. Champions both, they were eager and ready and no suggestion arose as to the courage of the competing players. Charley Grimm, disabled captain of the Cubs, had returned to the battlefield and was pronounced fit. Bing Miller, swarthy right fielder of the A's was a minor casualty, suffering from a cold, but he was ready to play.

All the "big shots" and the dark horses too, awaited only the opportunity to go out and justify the faith of their wildly excited fan following.
