

FOUR CLASHES WILL FEATURE GRIDIRON MENU

All Members Western Conference to See Action—Cougar-Bear Contest May Be Close—Trojans Favored at Seattle.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 11.—(AP) Four conference clashes head tomorrow's list of football exhibitions for Pacific coast fans, with all 10 members of the western gridiron loom swinging into action.

Three teams face conference opponents for the first time this season, and two of the eleven figure in one of the outstanding clashes of the day. They are the Cougar eleven of Washington State college, and the Bears of the University of California, who will come to grips in the Berkeley stadium.

The Cougars gave the Bears plenty of trouble last year, and although they lost 13 to 3, the principal cause of their defeat was six punts that Halfback Porter Linnhardt had blocked. The result of tomorrow's game will probably not find more than a touchdown difference in the score.

The other major clash of the day finds the Southern California Trojans battling the Washington Huskies. Early in the season, this contest was looked upon as one of the crucial games of the 1929 conference race. Since last week's tie between Washington and Montana, however, the Trojans have been installed as great favorites to win.

At Los Angeles, the Stanford Cardinals, with their coach, Pop Warner, 2,000 miles away, siding up the Trojan-Husky encounter, will run up against the baby of the conference, the University of California in Los Angeles. An overwhelming victory for the Cardinals is anticipated.

The other conference encounter will be between Idaho and Montana, the two mystery teams of the loop. Oregon State will meet Columbia University of Oregon at Corvallis, and Oregon will tangle with Willamette at Eugene, in the two non-conference clashes that round out the day's activities for conference teams.

Roofs Near Shibe Will Accommodate Many Series Fans

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11.—(AP) Some 1200 persons will pay to see the A's and the Cubs play the third game of the world's series today but their investment will not be counted in the day's receipts at Shibe Park.

These fans will be accommodated in temporary seats built atop buildings along twentieth street, which faces the ball park.

Prices of tickets range from \$10 to \$25. The owner of one of the larger places spent \$500 to build 175 seats to conform with city building regulations. He expects to get \$11 a seat, the extra dollar to go for the government tax.

BLEACHER SEEKERS AT PHILLY MOSTLY YOUNG

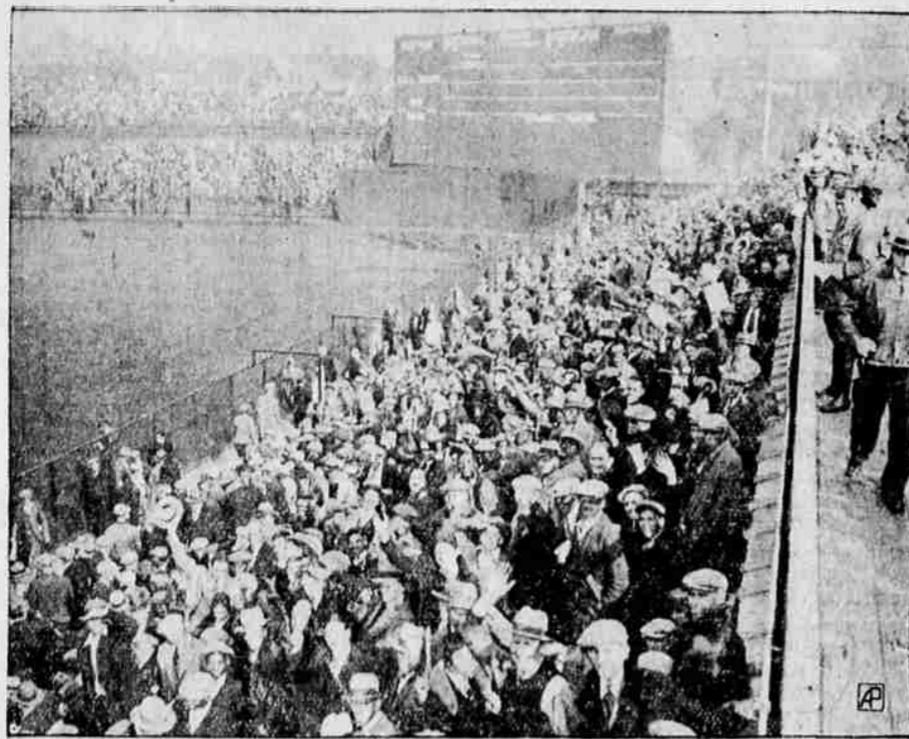
PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 11.—(AP) Five hundred more persons know today what it is like to lineup all night waiting for a ticket to a world's series ball game.

LARDNER'S HUMOR SEEN IN COMEDY BASEBALL TALKIE

The laughable baseball comedy, "Fast Company," which opened a three days' engagement at Hunt's Craterian theater yesterday, is a peculiarly appropriate attraction for that play-house, running as it does, concurrently with the Chicago Cubs-Philadelphia Athletics games. But this is not the only good thing of the entertainment program, which includes a Fox Movietone newsreel with an address by Premier MacDonald of England as one of the features, a Pat Rooney family short talking comedy, "The Royal Pair," and a monologue, "Humorous Flights."

"Fast Company" is a rollicking comedy that depicts a colossal concerted small town "saw" in the sticks, but a real ball player, nevertheless, successfully breaking direct into the New York Yankees, big league team and by his bat proves winning the world's championship for them.

While its situations, capable acting and humorous wisecracks are especially relished by baseball fans, one need not understand baseball to be a fan to thoroughly enjoy "Fast Company." Although the comedy is not of the slapstick kind this talking film keeps the audience in an excellent humor all the way, bringing forth chuckles, mild laughs and at times as the plot unfolds, boisterous laughter.

It has romance, too, and fast action, and the baseball scenes, depicting spring practice in a southern training camp and episodes from the final game which won the world's championship, are especially interesting.

Jack Oakie, an Elmer Kane, the great ball player from the bushes, who remains a sap otherwise to the end, is the star of "Fast Company," which also features Richard "Skeets" Gallagher as Bert Walker, the team scout and sort of caretaker of Elmer, and himself another likable screen comedian, as runner-up to Oakie.

Sam Hardy in a straight part, as the team manager, and Evelyn Brent and Gwen Lee as a team in a sister act in yandeville, are others of the cast who contribute much to the success of this film story.

Miss Brent has one of the best natural speaking voices in the film world, and Miss Lee's wisecracks and general hard-boiled attitude furnish many of the laughs.

Although the dialogue episodes between Oakie and Gallagher furnish the principal mirth, there are many other laugh producing bits scattered throughout, and the lines show the irrepressible wit of King Lardner, the humorist, who wrote the story.

Elmer remains all through the story, despite his persistent conceit that he is the greatest ball player in the world, a very lovable, clean and human person.

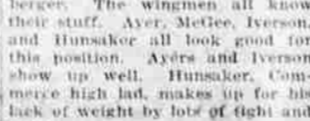

Rodgers came to Portland last summer, replacing Ernie Johnson, now manager of the Seattle club. It was rumored here that Rodgers may purchase a third interest in a western league club.
