Former Engineer Pacific Highway Visits Medford

Frank A. Kittredge, chief engineer of the national park system, with offices in San Francisco, returned home today after a three days' visit with Supt. E. C. Golinsky of the Crater Lake National park and visited the park.

He says the road around the rim will be put in first class shape next year and construction will start on the new rim road the next year. He will take two or three years to build it.

Mr. Kittredge was assistant engineer under Mr. Bowly when the first paved roads were built in this county between Medford and Central Point. This was also one of the first pieces of paved road in Oregon.

Mr. Kittredge notes marked improvements in Medford since his last visit and is proud of the growth in attendance at Crater Lake.

The advantages of pasteurized milk over raw milk are related in a recent bulletin issued by the Bureau of Dairy Industry of the United States department of agriculture and recently sent to the city health department.

The bulletin is as follows:

JACKSON COUNTY DAIRY SITUATION WILL BE STUDIED

A post and economic study of the dairy industry in Jackson county is to be carried on for the next two years by the Oregon Agricultural Experiment station, headquarters Corvallis, according to R. G. Fowler, county agent, who is assisting the experiment station in selecting dairymen who will co-operate in the work.

About 20 dairymen will be chosen from an entirely impartial list of dairymen in the county who have six or more cows. These men will be visited by representatives of the experiment station, who will be in the county within a few days to get the work under way.

The work in Jackson county will be part of a state-wide study of the dairy industry, the most important of which centers in Oregon with the possible exception of wheat raising. The investigation will be one of the most comprehensive cost studies ever made. It is planned to obtain reports from about 500 farmers each year, distributed approximately 200 in the Willamette valley, 100 in the coast regions, and 100 in eastern Oregon.

Objectives of the study as set forth in the project outline are to determine (1) costs of producing dairy products in the different regions and for various types of dairy herds, (2) means of reducing costs so that increasing competition can be met successfully, (3) regions of the state where dairymen can advantageously be encouraged on the basis of comparative costs, prices, markets, etc., (4) types of dairy farming that are most profitable and factors in the internal organization of a dairy farm that are most important, (5) the economic place of dairymen in Oregon agriculture.

The work will be carried on entirely with federal funds that are made available by the Federal act for use in this state.

All information obtained from the dairymen will be kept strictly confidential, no individual figures being published or divulged. The dairymen who co-operate in the work, however, will receive for each year individual summaries of the reports for their own farms as well as summaries of the average for all farms covered by the study. They will also receive the complete report that will be published when the project is completed.

COUNTY OFFICES HONOR COLUMBUS

In honor of the day on which Christopher Columbus discovered this country, all of the court house offices were closed except that of the county health unit, which were also the city treasurer's and city recorder's offices and the courts, but the federal departments were open as usual, as were the Medford banks, which up until a year or so ago, always observed Columbus day by closing all day.

The local banks closed at noon, as always on Saturday, but the Ashland banks were closed all day.

Outside of this closing there was no formal observance of the day in Medford. Yesterday afternoon Columbus Day programs were observed in the public school along with the usual routine work.

Away from Main street and nearly hidden on Sixth, the police department was in its new quarters today in the city hall building in remodeled offices. The department is in the same quarters it occupied three years ago before moving to the old Jacksonville railroad depot on West Main street, which is to be torn down.

MEDFORD PEARS APPRECIATED IS CHANEY'S REPORT

Medford pears made a big hit at the national American Legion convention at Louisville, Ky., and Oregon was the only state to hold open house, according to Attorney Newton C. Chaney, who returned yesterday with Mrs. Chaney from the convention city.

He reported that the Salem drum corps, under the leadership of Lloyd Williamson of Medford, missed the national championship by a fraction of one point, taking fifth place, competition being so close. Salem placed second in the preliminary contest and probably would have won first, in the opinion of Attorney Chaney, had they been contained in a more military uniform. As far as music was concerned, it was generally agreed that Salem was of championship caliber.

The Oregon delegation, under the chairmanship of Ben Dorris, did much in the election of O. L. Bodenhammer of Little Rock, Ark., for national commander, said Mr. Chaney, explaining that Oregon delegates met every evening at 5:30 comparing reports of progress in pushing Bodenhammer to the fore.

The convention parade was an awe-inspiring spectacle and took six hours to pass a given point. The state department of Massachusetts alone had parade entries over an hour long. Oregon was 22nd in line, taking last place in keeping with its membership standing in the organization.

Oregon was the only state that gave out free fruit, jerked flap and other products at the headquarters in the Brown hotel, which was crowded day and night with visitors from all parts of the United States, bringing valuable publicity to Oregon and the west coast.

While en route home Mr. and Mrs. Chaney visited the former's home at Cleburne, Texas, where his mother is seriously ill and not expected to long survive. It was principally because of her illness, he said, that he made the trip.
