## New President of The American Legion Auxiliary

Mrs. Donald Macrae of Council Bluffs, Iowa, is the new national president of the American Legion Auxiliary, elected at the national convention in Louisville, Ky., on October 3. When the Iowa department of the Auxiliary was formed, she was elected the first department president and given the task of perfecting the state organization. Her work was so successful that she was re-elected for a second year as department president.  
 Mrs. Macrae attended the first national convention in Kansas City, Mo., in the fall of 1921, and was appointed chairman of the National Child Welfare committee and had an important part in formulating the Auxiliary's national program for the care of dependent children of world war veterans. In 1922 she was elected national vice president for the central division. Under Mrs. Macrae's administration the Iowa department made outstanding records in membership.  
 Following her retirement from the department presidency, Mrs. Macrae has been very active in her unit, department and national organization in many important capacities. One of her most outstanding being Department American Legion chairman, which post she filled for three years.  
 Mrs. Macrae is a member of the Council Bluffs Women's club, the Parent-Teachers' association and the Auxiliary to the Spanish War Veterans; organized the Council Bluffs council of the Girl Scouts and served as council president; is prominent in musical circles; is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and has served as regent of her chapter. Her husband is Dr. Donald Macrae, II, noted Iowa surgeon. Dr. Macrae served in the Spanish-American war with the 51st Iowa regiment and in the world war he was medical officer in charge of Mobile Hospital No. 1, winning five citations, the Croix de Guerre and the distinguished service medal. Their son, Donald Macrae, acting captain at Camp Leavenworth, Cal., at the close of the world war, and their daughter, Marion, served in the motor corps.

Her poised and pleasing personality were evident in her work over the radio and only words of pleasure, surprise and appreciation are heard from musicians interested in the conservation of talent, as well as the personal friends of the young artist.
