Tummy Is Favorite

TROJANS TRIM HUSKIES 48-0; BEARS VICTORS

U. S. C. Hands Washington Terrific Trouncing—Hufford's Touchdown Illegal—California Takes to Air To Beat Washington State.

WASHINGTON STADIUM SEATTLE, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The thundering herd of southern California was a chain of lightning in northern Washington today, and with a mighty roar blasted the Pacific coast conference championship chance of the University of Washington. The powerful Trojans trounced the Huskies 48 to 0.

After speeding the first 12 minutes of the game with their backs against their own goal posts, the southern California warriors led by their dynamic quarterback, Russell Saunders, burst into a mighty battering ram. The thundering herd stamped up and down the field, scoring touchdowns virtually at will.

The Washington Huskies pounced onto the gridiron primed to the minute. They caught the Trojans by surprise and worked the ball into U. S. C. territory before the game was five minutes old.

Coach Enouch Bagshaw saw a chance to score and sent in his spectacular halfback, Merle Hufford to replace Pulver. After three Husky line snafus which gave Saunders yardage Hufford took the ball and raced around right end to reach the U. S. C. goal line, but he had stepped out of bounds on the 17-yard line.

Jesse Hill followed with another touchdown a few minutes later and Hufford garnered his second to wind up the scoring spree in the second quarter. Musick broke into the scoring column in the third period when he shot through right tackle, seven yards from the Husky goal and planked the ball behind the line. Saunders piled up another touchdown a few minutes later when he circled right end for the necessary yard after the Trojans had shoved the Huskies backwards for 50 yards.

In the last period Coach Howard Jones sent the majority of his regulars to the showers and a new combination took up the work. Washington waged a fierce battle against the substitutes in an effort to score but the Huskies pounded and passed in vain.

When it looked as if the scoring was over with, Aspit intercepted a Washington pass on the Husky 23-yard line and sprinted to the goal line as the gun terminated the game. Shaver converted the try for point while hundreds of persons swarmed onto the field.

MEMORIAL STADIUM, BERKELEY, Cal., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Out of air today, California's Bears plucked a 14-0 victory over Washington State college when repeated onslaughts of the ground failed to crumble a powerful Cougar line.

While 10,000 spectators cheered, the Bears rushed their northern rivals down the field in the first half to twice leave imprints in the red turf. A touchdown in the first period was followed by another in the second.

The crushing first half drive of the Bears came in good time for in most of the last two periods the team from the north was charging goalward in thrilling but futile efforts to retaliate.

It was the opening coast conference game for the two teams and in turning back their opponents, the Bears moved one of the most formidable eleven of the northland.

LAST QUARTER TOUCHDOWN IS MEDFORD EDGE

Grants Pass Shows Strength—Forward Pass Paves Way For Victory, After Even Battle—Backfield Better But Line Leaks—Ashland Defeated.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP)—Marshfield defeated Ashland high school here today 6 to 0, putting over the lone touchdown in the last few minutes of play. North Bend defeated Bendon 12 to 0.

The Medford high school football team, weakened by the loss of its two star halfbacks, through injury and indigibility, defeated the Grants Pass high school at Grants Pass yesterday afternoon seven to nothing, before a large crowd, and beneath a warm October sun, that made it too hot for football.

The game was in doubt until the closing minutes of the fourth quarter. Grants Pass, considered as a set-up for the locals, displayed unexpected strength, and battled Hazan's crew on even terms, for three quarters.

After an exchange of punts Medford received the ball on her own 40-yard line, as the final period was drawing to a close, with a scoreless tie looming.

Harrington, half, slipped through right tackle for seven yards, but on the next play, a forward pass from Clay to Harrington was intercepted. Harrington then made it first down, on the 25-yard line.

A pass from Clay to Wentzel netted 15 yards, putting the ball on the ten-yard line. Clay and Harrington bucked the ball to the one-foot line, and Potter zoomed through for the touchdown that saved the day.

The Grants Pass team never seriously threatened to score, being unable to penetrate beyond the 20-yard line, but made yardage consistently, but lacked the power for the finishing touches.

The center of the Medford line was strong, but the tackles and the ends were weak, many long gains being made through both tackles and around both ends.

The backfield, with Wentzel in Stine's old position showed improvement. Clay did not get into the fray except near the end of the first half, and again just before Medford started her drive for the deciding touchdown, and figured prominently in this drive.

Harrington gained more or less consistently, and Zumburn and Walker played a steady game.

For Grants Pass, Jones, a dash-half, and Gillette starred, and were a constant menace. The Grants Pass team outweighed the locals, and were much better than when they were mauled by Klamath Falls.

The Grants Pass fans were mad with joy.

OREGON'S BIG 2 HAS EASY TIME WITH SMALL FRY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Oregon trampled Willamette 34 to 0 today on Hayward field in a non-conference gridiron battle. Oregon started the game with six regulars in the lineup and rolled up a large score early in the contest.

Throughout the first half the Webfoet elicited only a variety of around gaining plays but the second half, marred by numerous penalties and fumbles, reduced the game to a monotonous scramble.

Oregon veterans entered the game from time to time but, with the exception of Johnny Kitzmiller, none were in for longer than a warm-up.

Kitzmilller, coming into the contest later in the third quarter, placed the Oregonians in position for their first score of the second half. The "Flying Dutchman" took a lateral pass from Spear and ran 31 yards to the five-yard line. The quarter ended with the play, but when the ball was taken to the other end of the field, Al Brown carried it across the goal.

A few minutes later, after plunging the ball up the field on a combination of two end runs and lateral passes, Kitzmiller scored from the eight-yard line.

Brown was the first of the Webfoet to score. He went across from the one-yard line after a pass, Mason to Robinson, had carried the ball to that point. Donohue scored in the second half on a play off tackle from the three-yard line.

Mason ended the scoring in the first half when he went through from the seven-yard line.

Twice Willamette rose to great defensive strength and held the Webfoet within the five-yard line. In the third quarter Donohue had advanced the ball to the one-yard line but neither Mason nor Robinson were able to buck it across. Two attempts for a touchdown met with failure.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 12.—(AP) Oregon State celebrated Columbus day at the expense of Columbia University of Portland here by downing the fighting Irishmen 31 to 7.

The Oregon parade began on the fourth play when Montgomery scored on a fake reverse and ended late in the fourth period when the diminutive Nosler ran back a punt 25 yards for the eleventh touchdown.

Columbia's lone score came just before the first half ended, when Davis pulled the deadman stunt on his own 20-yard line, taking a pass from Costello and racing 65 yards to score. Only at one other time did Columbia get the ball in Oregon territory, and the Irishmen made no gains from scrimmage.

Coach Schisler started a team of reserves piloted by Montgomery, whose early score was followed by one by Essman. The third string went in at the quarter, making three more touchdowns.

Columbia was most effective with passes, completing several long ones, but intercepted passes also counted for two of the State's touchdowns, the stand was full of scouts who saw little as Schisler used only simple plays.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 12.—(AP)—A game but decidedly outclassed University of California at Los Angeles eleven which refused to step aside and let Stanford's stalwarts pass, was crushed before an avalanche of nine touchdowns here today. The score was 57 to 0.
