The theory in addiction disease is that the opiate or toxin is injected into the body, produces the body to manufacture antitoxin or anti-bodies. Pinally the body gets surcharged with antitoxin and requires the toxin or opiate poison to be injected to neutralize the antitoxin. The symptoms are at first a vague uneasiness and restlessness, mental anguish and torment, nerv-

mental anguish and torment, nerv-comness and twitching, patient talkative or morose; jorky move-ments, dryness or skin, then sweating and nucous secretions; itch-ing of nose, sneezing, numbers, durting pains, anxious and werried

carring pains, anxious and werried expression; cramps or muscles and in abdomen; vomiting, purging, excruciating hodily pains, weakness, difficult breathing, rapid, weak heart, exhaustion, collapse, death, There are many addicts who were defective before they became addicted. Probably 75 per cent of addicts, are unworthy of any sympathy, but on the other hand, perhaps 25 per cent are deserving and haps 25 per cent are deserving and honest people who should have the consideration of their trials suf-ferings, and struggles. Only about two per cent acquire the addiction disease from medication from doc

A deserving addict probably has a family, a business, and is trying his best to keep up. After many his best to keep up. After many years of worry, poor appellic, suffering, he becomes pale, undernourished, stooped, argued, infirm, untruthful, persistent, husky voice, unreliable, sexually weak—a wretched victim of a self-poisoning disease.


