# WARN RURAL SECTIONS OF TYPHOID MENACE

Although no cases have been reported this week, there is still a possibility of a spread of typhoid fever in Jackson county, according to Dr. Emily Bolcom, county medical director, who advises residents of rural sections to be certain of their water supply and to give first attention to sanitary conditions about their ranches. Sanitation can be used as one of the best preventive measures against the disease, said the doctor.

Dr. Bolcom is paying especial attention to the typhoid situation, and is anxious to keep it to the present low level of the two or three active cases. If there is any suspicion in regard to water, the doctor advises the supply be chlorinated or boiled.
