

FRANCIS NEFF IN LINEUP FOR SONS SATURDAY

Former Medford Linesman to Play Against Menlo Park—Ashland Students Coming En Masse to Witness Hard Contest.

Francis Neff, a former Medford high school linesman, will play his old position of right guard for the Southern Oregon normal school of Ashland when their football team meets the Menlo Junior college of San Francisco here. Menlo is close to Stanford university and many of its gridiron stars find their way to Top Warner's squad.

The game will be called at 3 o'clock at Van Scoyoc field and will be the first college game of the season for this city.

WILL RUSH WORK STREETS, SEWERS

The work of grading and graveling, paving and the construction of sewers on several streets, the contracts for which were let by the city council at a special meeting yesterday afternoon, will be begun at once and all the work will be completed before the winter season set in, unless inclement weather should prevent.

In each instance the contracts were let to the lowest bidder, although all the bids were close.

The three bids for paving of Reddy avenue from the west line of McAndrews street to the east line of Lindley avenue were submitted by L. O. Harrold, R. E. Stewart & Son and the Medford Concrete Construction Co., and the latter was awarded the contract on its bid of \$6098.50.

The contracts for the other improvement work were all awarded to R. L. Stewart & Son as follows: Grading and graveling of Narregon street between West Jackson and Clark streets, \$1737.50; grading and graveling of West Tenth street from South Central one-half block distant, \$185; sewers on West Tenth from Hamilton to some distance west, \$384.20; on Columbus street for some distance, \$874.40; lots 6, 7, 8 and 9, Grey's addition, \$270.40.

Mr. Alfred was enthusiastic about the reception given them all along the line and particularly in Medford.

Local Physician Declares Basic Principle of Narcotic Act Sound

Discussion of the Harrison Drug Act, relative to the prescription of narcotics to dope addicts by physicians, occupied the attention of members of the Jackson County Medical association at the semi-monthly meeting held last Wednesday evening at the home of Dr. E. G. Swedenburg in this city.

That the principals of the Harrison Drug act are sound and that doctors are negligent, and sometimes forgetful of the letter of the law, was the contention of Dr. J. J. Emmens of Medford, who had the paper of the evening and lead in the discussion. That it is a federal regulation which no one

has a right to violate and no group of doctors can successfully battle it was the belief of Dr. Emmens. The main objection of the doctors lay in the method of enforcement, rather than in the provisions of the law itself. Doctors Adams and Emmens of Medford and Doctor E. A. Woods of this city were named on a committee to draft a resolution to be directed to the federal authorities, relative to the position of the county association in the matter. This resolution will be discussed and acted upon at the next meeting. Recent prosecution in federal

court of a prominent Klamath Falls physician for violation of the act, aroused the interest of physicians. Dr. Emmens emphasized the necessity of physicians familiarizing themselves with the provisions of the Harrison Act and acting accordingly.

Dr. Soule, whose acquittal by a jury followed a hard-fought case with an under-cover addict as the chief witness for the prosecution, and Dr. Dietsche, Klamath physician who faces a similar charge and whose case was continued, were guests of the Jackson county doctors last night.

Previous to the discussion on narcotic regulations, Dr. Woods demonstrated sectioning of tissue for microscopic examination by a method demonstrated by a Mayo clinic expert at the American

Medical association meeting held in Portland. All members of the association save four were in attendance at the meeting last night, together with guests from Klamath and Phoenix.

Following the meeting refreshments were served by Mrs. Swedenburg.—Ashland Tidings.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Further unsettlement developed in today's stock market as a result of the uneasiness created by the sharp rise in brokers' loans last week to within \$5,000,000 of the high record. Extreme declines in many of the active issues ranged from 1

to 10 points but recoveries, running as high as 4 points, took place in some issues in the early afternoon as a result of short covering. Trading showed a tendency to turn dull on the rallies and speed up on the declines.

Several high priced stocks made substantial gains during the last hour, Western Union advancing 8 points, National Lead 5, Columbian Carbon 4, and General Electric 3. Adams Express extended its rise to 536. U. S. Steel, however, met fresh selling after it had crossed 219, and Murray Corporation dropped to a new low at 45. The closing tone was heavy. Total sales approximated 3,200,000 shares.

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The New York Stock Exchange announced today that total borrowings by members against stock col-

lateral on October 1 amounted to 9.82 per cent of the market value of all listed shares, compared with 8.79 per cent on September 1, an increase of 1.03 per cent during the month.

On October 1, the market value of all shares listed on the stock exchange totaled \$87,073,630,423, against \$89,668,276,845 on September 1, a decrease of \$2,594,646,431 for the month.
