

WUHU IS QUIET MOORS ATTACK AFTER LOOTING FRENCH TROOPS BY MUTINEERS 50 ARE KILLED

Foreigners Reported Safe in Troubled Anwei Province Town — Troops Driven Out—British Send Warships to Scene.

SHANGHAI, China, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Advice from the city of Wuhu, in the province of Anwei, today indicated that some nationalist government troops had mutinied there this morning but were driven from the city.

Latest reports said that Wuhu was quiet and that all the foreigners there were safe.

It was authoritatively learned that all the foreigners, including about six Americans, evacuated the city and went aboard the Japanese and British gunboats. The foreigners included 70 Japanese and 30 of other nationalities.

Authentic accounts of what took place at Wuhu indicated that the trouble there started when the nationalist government attempted to disarm a contingent of troops belonging to Feng Chen-Wu, chairman of the Anwei government. Feng had been dismissed by Nanking yesterday because of his doubtful allegiance. Feng's troops also were reported to have attempted to export \$100,000 (Mexican) from the residents of Wuhu, which was refused.

The troops opened fire on the city at 3 o'clock this morning and looted the area to an extent not yet known. Loyal nationalist government forces clashed with the rebels and after a day of fighting and disorders drove them from the city.

Wuhu is only 80 miles from Nanking and it was understood that the Nanking government was rushing additional forces by motor truck.

The British naval authorities have ordered H. M. S. Lady Bird to Wuhu from Kiangang and also H. M. S. Onat from Nanking.

DEATH TOLL NINE IN SEATTLE FIRE

SEATTLE, Oct. 18.—(AP)—The death of John Miller, 59, rail worker, today brought the death toll of the Portland hotel fire here yesterday to nine. Miller was severely burned.

Officials were engaged today in an intensive search for the pyromaniac whom they declared was responsible for the fire. The hotel, located on lower First avenue, was destroyed by incendiary fire. Marshal Robert L. Lange pronounced the blaze the work of a firebug who has been operating in the district for several months.

Of the dead, six were identified by the coroner last night as John Brink, 29, Lynden, Wash.; Harold George, 19, transient, en route to Los Angeles; James Liddle, 56, Seattle; James Martin, 47, Seattle; Thomas O'Malley, 21, Seattle; William A. Martin, 54, Seattle.

BROKER COOKE IN CELL ON MONDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 18.—(AP)—James P. Cooke, former president of the defunct Overbeck and Cooke bond house, convicted on a charge of embezzlement, will surrender himself Monday to start his seven-year term in the state penitentiary at Salem, Ore.

The United States supreme court decision upholding the circuit court conviction of Cooke was entered with the clerk here today. Cooke is at liberty under \$15,000 bond.

The broker was convicted after the bond house closed its doors with a loss of several thousands to speculators.

Asked for Loan
On November 23, 1922, Fall telephoned him asking for the loan. Fall, he said, explained the difficulty of handling checks in New Mexico and asked for cash, which Doheny sent the next day by his son.

When the son returned he gave the witness Fall's note which did not contain the rate of interest, his son saying Fall had left it blank, as he thought Doheny should set the rate.

Doheny said he tore the signature off the note so it would not embarrass Fall in case of his (Doheny's) unexpected death, as it was a demand note.

Tribesmen Cut Up Column of Foreign Legion in Atlas Mountains—Rescue Column Beats Off Attacking Moorish Tribe.

ORAN, Algeria, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Moorish tribesmen have made another raid on French troops on the south slopes of the Atlas mountains, cutting up a column of the French Foreign Legion. Fifty legionnaires and native soldiers were killed and 21 wounded. The tribesmen left many dead on the field.

Another column of the foreign legion came up in time to beat off the Moors, who had descended from the Tafellet region of Morocco, on the southern slopes of the Atlas range. This is one of the most active dissident areas.

A French airplane on a scouting flight saw the attack and was able to give directions quickly to the rescuing columns. The plane also carried the more seriously wounded of the French troops to the hospital at Oran.

The attack, which occurred yesterday, was the first recorded in some months.

HOOVER PLANS U.S. DELEGATION TO NAVY CONFAB

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Besides selecting Secretary Stimson as head of the American delegation to the London arms conference in January, President Hoover plans to appoint a number of other delegates, including some senators.

The chief executive has been advised by some senate leaders with whom he has discussed the subject that two or more members of the senate should be in the delegation. Just how many Mr. Hoover will finally select remains for his determination.

He talked over the matter yesterday with Senator Watson of Indiana, the Republican senate leader, and is believed to have broached it at subsequent conferences with Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee and Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the minority leader.

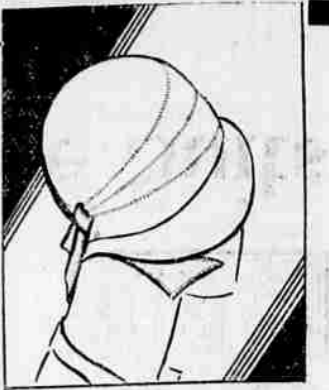
