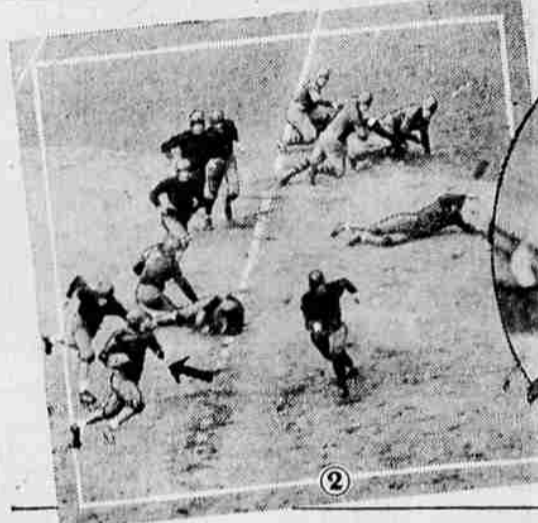
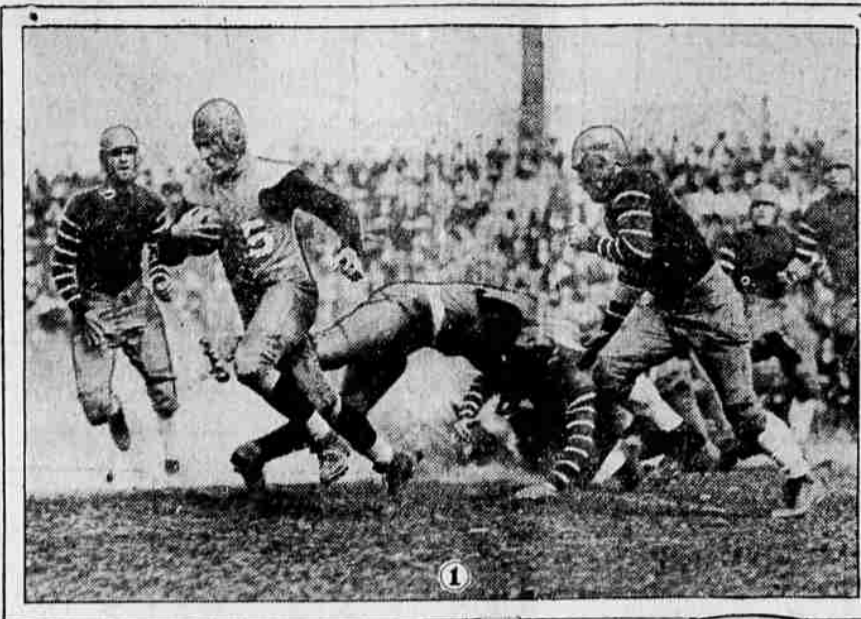


CAMERAGRAMS

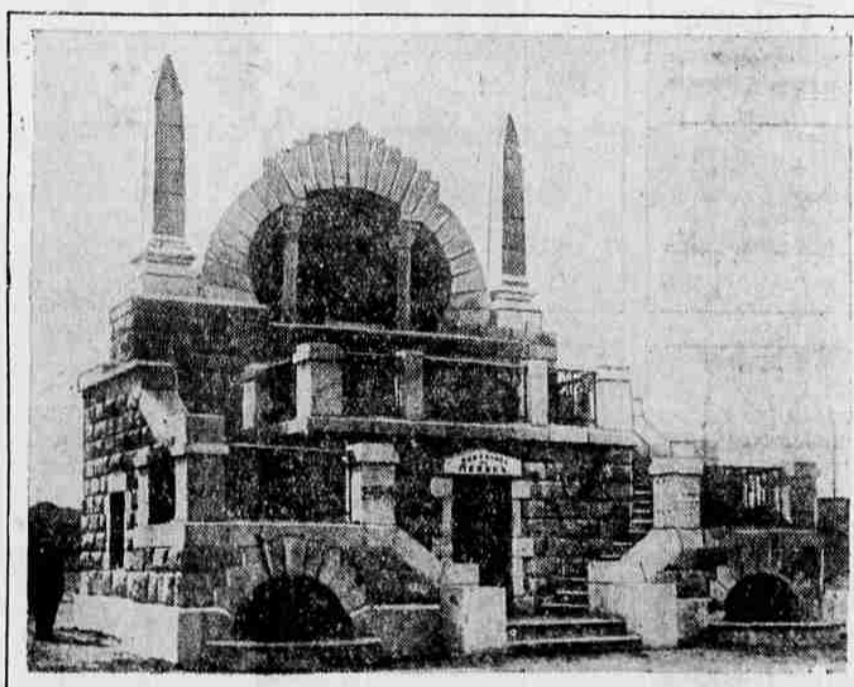

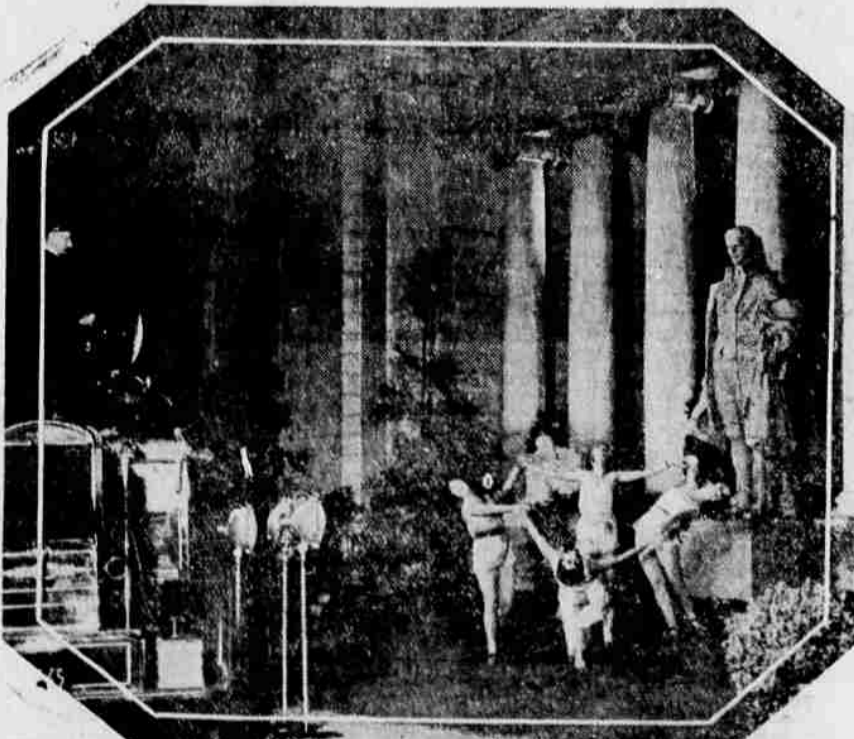
