

HILAH TEMPLE PLANS MERRY GOOS BAY TRIP

Next Saturday, the members of the Hilah Temple will make a pilgrimage to Marshfield where a record-breaking fall celebration will be staged. Hundreds of Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Grants Pass men will join the festive horde which will invade the coast city in festive spirit, dispensing all gloom along their path.

And Marshfield will be ready for her shining visitors according to word received from Coos Bay. Marshfield merchants are decorating their windows for the occasion and the principal streets will be gayly dressed with Shrine colors and decorations. Busy Shrine committees in the coast metropolises have been working out the many details of the big one-day jamboree and Director E. P. Older and his wrecking crew have some brand new and diabolical methods of tribute for a large class of novices.

"E. C. 'Jerry' Jerome, Potentate of Hilah Temple has received a gratifying response to his invitations recently sent to various Shrine temples throughout the west coast and, according to advance information, there will be a large number of temples represented at the Marshfield conclave. After a recent trip to the coast, Potentate Jerome reports that Marshfield is making every effort to eclipse in brilliance and color the Shrine ceremonial held in Medford last May.

The Hilah patrol, winner of wide acclaim in Los Angeles during the Imperial Session last June, will again make a public appearance on the streets of Marshfield and during the ceremonial sessions. Captain Rex Barnett has been whipping his patrol into tip-top drilling shape during the past two months and they should reflect much credit on the Rogue River Valley at the Hilah ceremonial. The Klamath Falls drum corps is also ready for the Marshfield Shrine gathering, according to word received from the Pelican city. Bert Peasley, business manager of the patrol, has arranged for special busses to carry the marching bodies to the coast.

A sweeping invitation to all Shriners, whether affiliated with Hilah Temple or not, to attend the Marshfield ceremonial has been extended by Potentate Jerry Jerome.

FRUIT SHIPMENTS PASS 3000 MARK

Over 3000 cars of pears have been shipped from Medford so far this season, including 28 cars on Friday night and a number nearly as large yesterday.

If the present rate of shipments continue, the season's total is expected to reach a total of over 3500. While from 80 to 90 per cent of the fruit crop has been picked, there are a large number of cars in storage that will be shipped to eastern markets during the winter season.

FOURTH CAR OF DETROIT BOSCS READY TO SELL

OPEN BANKRUPTCY PROCEEDINGS FOR JOHNSON MARKET

In response to a petition filed in the Portland district court last week by a list of creditors of Edgar Johnson, local market owner, asking that the latter go into involuntary bankruptcy, an order was received by Harry Skyrman, referee, Friday, adjudicating Johnson to be bankrupt on the petition.

As a further step in the procedure a petition was filed by three of the 65 creditors yesterday naming Earl H. Fehl and P. C. Bigham as trustees for the position of receiver in bankruptcy. Mr. Skyrman will act upon the petition next week. The three creditors signing this were the Home Telephone company, the Pacific Record Herald and the Colonial Garage.

Don R. Newbury was appointed by Circuit Judge Harry Norton last Thursday as receiver for the Johnson market, in the mortgage foreclosure suit of C. A. Whillock and F. E. Wahl vs. Edgar and Edith Johnson. Judge Norton has the jurisdiction over mortgage foreclosures.

The matter of which receivership will govern ultimately, will be determined within the course of the next two weeks when a bankruptcy court will be held in the Federal building.
