Wednesday Study Club Enjoy Study of Japan.
The Wednesday Study Club held its regular meeting at the library Wednesday, October 16th.

The early history of Japan was the subject of a most interesting paper by Mrs. J. F. Lawrence.

All records of events in Japan before the fifth century were handed down from one generation to another by oral tradition, hence events of the period are largely mythical. The Imperial Dynasty extends beyond that of any reigning house of Europe and its reputed origin is traced to the Sun Goddess. Her chapel of Jewels, swords and mirror are still the insignia of the Imperial House of Japan.

The fifth to the ninth century was marked by a strong continental influence. China was at that time in a high state of development and her civilization spread through Korea into Japan. But it was through the Buddhist religion that Japan received its greatest contribution of culture from China.

In 1633 all commerce with other nations was forbidden and no Japanese was permitted to leave the country under pain of death. Japan isolated herself from foreign influence for over two hundred years. During this time the country prospered, wealth increased and literature was encouraged. In 1854 Commander Perry succeeded in negotiating a treaty with Japan by which two ports were opened to foreign commerce.

"Within fifty years," says Bryan, in Japan from within, "she has codified her laws, instituted modern judiciary, eliminated extra territoriality, revised the foreign treaties in her own favor, secured national autonomy, defeated China, Russia and Germany and taken her seat among her aggressors as an equal in the supreme councils of the world."

The story of Ronald McDonald and Eva Emery Dye was reviewed by Mrs. L. B. Humphreys in a very pleasing manner. The fur traders, pioneers and Dr. McLaughlin served as a background

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and the review dwelt on McDonald's interest in Japan. Three Japanese sailors rescued from a shipwreck, aroused in Ronald McDonald a great desire to know something of this "Hermit Nation." Becoming a sailor on a whaling vessel, he later arranged to be put adrift near the coast of Japan. His landing, treatment, imprisonment and ultimate release furnish the interesting theme for this part of the book, closing with his return home after sailing the "Seven Seas."
