SOME HAVE DEER, OTHERS A GROUCH AS SEASON ENDS

The deer season closed at sunset yesterday and from late afternoon until well into the night deer hunters were skirting along into the city from the hills, a number of whom had carcasses of deer on the running boards of their cars. However, the majority were coming home without game.

The successful returning hunters need not have strapped their dead deer on the running boards to show what great hunters they are in their own estimation. Their erect attitude and smiling faces proclaimed that. The other nincompoops were slunk down in the seats of their cars, with well-developed groanings and full hopeless expressions on their faces.

However, most of the successful and unsuccessful ones alike still wore their red hats or caps and other bright colored deer hunting regalia, which theoretically tends to prevent hunters from being mistaken for deer.

For an easily accessible place, Table Lock served as one of the best deer hunting grounds of the past season, according to reports from hunters in the Sams Valley section. One Sams Valley man reported yesterday that he knew of seven deer that had been killed, one man killing two on a Sunday. There are many oak trees on the mountain and acorns are plentiful, supplying ample feed for the animals, which are said to be plentiful on the mountain, less than 15 miles from Medford and only a few hundred feet high, spotlight hunting of deer has been more prevalent this season than for the past few years, despite the heavy fines and jail sentences imposed on the offenders caught in their unscrupulous activities in southern Oregon. This was brought out Saturday from records of the state game commission by Harold Clifford, state game warden.

SCOUT INSPECTION FOR RATING SOON

This month the Boy Scout troops of Medford will be inspected by the scout commissioners and a comprehensive rating issued. The troops are scored on appearance, community service, troop records, oral quiz, patrol activity, advancement, and hikes. The plan has been in operation for a period of one year. The last inspection and rating was issued in April, 1929.

The plan was adopted at the suggestion of the scout masters and the commissioners so that a uniform system of troop inspection on a comprehensive basis might be achieved. The inspections are to be carried out by Larry Schade, scout master of the council; Walter H. Jones, scout commissioner of the district; Harold Brown and Fred Heath, Sr., deputy scout commissioners for the Medford district.

These inspections will also be carried on throughout the area, those of the Ashland district by the local district commissioner, as also will those of Grants Pass.

Troop 3 of Medford was first in the rating last time and Troop 14 of Beagle second. This time a summary of the ratings for the two periods will be made and a pennant will be awarded to all the troops attaining an honor standing. In order to reach this class it is necessary to achieve a rating of 80 per cent of that of the winner.

KIWANIS OBSERVE JUBILEE OF LIGHT

"Light's Golden Jubilee," now being celebrated throughout the United States as well as Europe, was the inspiration for an interesting program at the Kiwanis club luncheon at the Hotel Medford this noon. A reproduction of the first incandescent light perfected by Thomas A. Edison, October 21, 1879, was presented at the meeting by Jack Thompson, president of the organization.

A brief talk on the achievements of the leading inventor was given by Horace Bromley, who presented two reels of moving pictures, one entitled "The History of Light," which traced the development of light and heat from the days of the cave man. The second reel took up the work of Thomas A. Edison and other great inventors who have experimented with and improved artificial lighting through recent years.

Just the extent of injury done will be compiled and used to advantage by the weather bureau in their aid next year, according to Mr. Young.
