Co-operation (By G. A. Palmiter) "The Grange today fosters and urges co-operation as the best means of solving the problems of agriculture. However, we believe the first thing necessary is organization by the establishment of a Grange in every community where the farmer and his family can gather for discussion of their problems.

"The social features of the Grange furnish clean entertainment for its members and attract them to the meetings and the educational lecture programs which should feature every meeting, supply them with information on the important topics of the day as well as new ideas relative to conducting the business of the farm and the household.

"Many of the most successful co-operatives in operation today had their inception in the Grange although they do not bear the name of the Grange, and it is because of the education along these lines on the part of the

Grange that more co-operatives are being successful. However, I do not think that we should urge our members and others put their money into starting some cooperative business until they understand the real principles of cooperation and are ready to stay with it. Cooperation means a group of people together for the benefit of the entire group, not for personal gain.

"We find today many people who believe in cooperation and are willing to invest their money in some cooperative business enterprise, but at the same time they do not understand the principles of cooperation and will not support their own enterprise if they can buy cheaper somewhere else. Neither will they deliver their products to their own cooperative if they are offered a few cents more for these products by some competing concern. Another thing, many of them take no interest in their business after they have signed on the dotted line and put up the money; they elect a manager and then forget about it. They seldom, if ever, attend a meeting of the stockholders or assist in the election of the board of directors and then if the business fails they blame 'cooperation' instead of themselves.

"Cooperative commodity organizations formed in each producing locality will not solve the farmers' problems or return him a profit unless all the local units can be amalgamated into a federation that will market the entire crop."—Extract from State Grange Master's report, 1929.

Pomona Grange The Pomona Grange of Jackson county will be held on Saturday, October 26, beginning at 10 a. m.

It is expected that the state Grange master, Geo. A. Palmiter, will be present at this meeting. Also C. A. Bailey, editor of the Grange Bulletin. These faithful Grange workers are always an inspiration and every Granger in the county should be present if at all possible. Remember that most of the Pomona work is done in the fourth degree, so even if you are not yet a Pomona member, you may have the opportunity of meeting these distinguished guests and hearing their talks, as well as listening to the discussion of the various measures brought before the Grange.

The lecture hour, which is held immediately after dinner, is in charge of the lecturer, Mrs. Lela Shepard, of Live Oaks Grange. It is open to the public, and well worth attending. The lecture has many first class entertainment features and often short talks by some prominent speakers on subjects of interest to all.

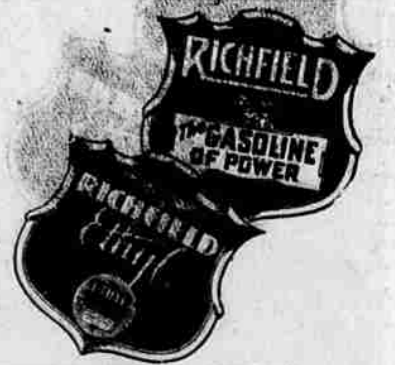
