

COUNTY COURT TALKS BUDGET NEED OF POOR

Indigent List, Widow's Pensions, Road Program and Framing of Forthcoming Budget Are Considered at Court Session.

Matters pertaining to the budget, indigents, widow's pensions, and the road program for next year were discussed by the county court, at its regular meeting today, the discussion centering in the budget, and the indigent list. The annual requests for widow's pension were discussed, and the court spent considerable time looking up the law on budget making. County Clerk Delilah Stevens Meyers, is now at Salem attending a meeting of state county clerks, and one of their objects is the framing of a uniform budget system. At present, every county in the state has a different way of preparing a budget, and the various legislatures have outlined seven or eight different ways to prepare a budget, all more or less violently different.

Lillian Roberts, Red Cross worker, conferred with the court on indigent aid and care. The worthy poor, and aged, and those buffeted by a cruel fate will not be forgotten, but the court desires to keep the indigent fund below that of last year, when it totalled over \$15,000. So heavy were the demands, that last summer the court was forced to cut 25 or 40 receivers of county aid off the list to prevent overdrawing of the fund before the end of the year. The county court is trying to work out a helpful, humane, and economical way of handling the indigent problem.

Roads Await Budget.

The road building program will not be determined until after the budget is approved, which will be about the first of the year. Completion of the Dead Indian and Lake Creek market roads will be among the principal roads to be built in 1930. Both were under construction this year, and both provide routes to Lake of the Woods and Fish Lake, popular recreational spots of southern Oregon. Completion of the Butte Falls-Prospect road, a feeder to the Lake Creek Market road, is also considered. Seven or eight miles of the road remain to be finished.

The Elk Creek loop road, tapping the Persimmon country, and running from Trail to where the Earl Ulrich road hits the Crater Lake highway, is also in line for improvement, by special road levy. It is also probable that with federal and state aid, the Diamond Lake road—long a terror to automobile drivers—will receive consideration.

Road meetings for the fixing of special levies for road work, will be held next month, and four districts have already submitted petitions to this end. They are Prospect, Butte Falls, Wimer and Eagle Point.

The usual batch of mid-month bills, pleas for tax refunds and remittances and much minor routine business was before the session.
