Approximately 69,000 young steelhead and silverside salmon were salvaged during the past month or six weeks from Sardinia, Gall, Trail and Sams creeks in Jackson county by the state game commission under the direction of W. R. Coleman, state superintendent of fish affairs. The actual work was done by Thomas Cline, who spent several weeks in taking the fish, between two and three inches long, out of shallow pools and placing them back in the river.

SAVE YOUNG FISH IN LOCAL CREEKS

The poor condition of the water courses made it impossible for the fish to find their way back to the river and would have otherwise been doomed to death. Over 27,000 fish alone were taken from Sardinia creek, including a small number of fish salvaged from other water courses, the total for the season's work, which was only recently completed, was announced yesterday by Mr. Coleman as 79,822.

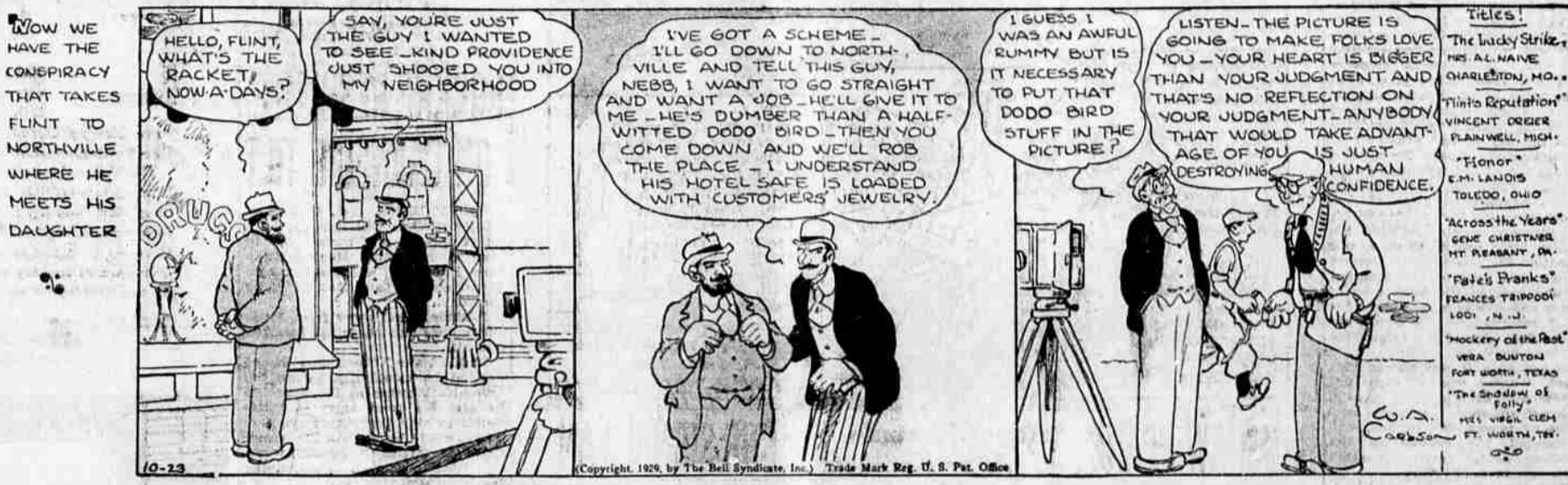
