

GRID STRUGGLE DECIDING FALL TO BE FEATURE IN SONNENBERG O. S. C. REUNION MATCH "QUEER"

Annual Homecoming Celebration at College Will Have Many Attractions—Festivities Open Tonight With Dances.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Oct. 24.—(Special.) While the football game between Oregon State college and the University of Idaho is the headline attraction for O. S. C. annual homecoming celebration here Saturday, October 25, many other events have been arranged to make it a full week end of entertainment for the thousands of visitors who will return to the campus.

The festivities will get under way Thursday evening when the annual rally dances will be held in fraternity and sorority houses. The traditional noise parade to be held Friday evening has caused unusual interest this year because all participants are required to wear pajamas or be costumed. Following the parade, a big student pep rally will be held in the stadium. Stirling talks will be made by Coach Paul J. Schiesler, Dean A. D. Corley and student body officers.

Those in charge of the rock bonfire have promised the largest blaze ever seen by a homecoming crowd. The old Phi Kappa Phi house which was partially burned recently will furnish the material for the freshmen have planned a 50-foot stack for this purpose. It will be lighted directly after the pep rally.

Other events include the interclass regatta on the Willamette river Saturday morning and the annual rock-sophomore olympics which will be held at homecoming for the first time this year.

Evidence of the elaborate decorations are already showing themselves. A large 60-foot tower on the campus will be the center of the decorations. Homecoming signs will decorate the tops of all the buildings on the campus and also all the fraternities, sorority and club houses. Prizes are being offered for the best signs.

Editors of the state again will be the official guests of the college and the department of industrial journalism at a luncheon Saturday noon and at the game in the afternoon.

A radio pep rally over station KOAC for those unable to attend the festivities has been arranged by the alumni association. The program will be held between 8 and 9 o'clock Thursday night. The game will be broadcast over OKAC Saturday afternoon as usual.
