

MANY BIRDS BAGGED BY EXPERT HUNTERS

Contrary to reports extant the first few days of the season, more pheasants have been killed in Jackson county during the season than for several years, according to experienced local sportsmen and the deputy game wardens.

Quite a number of hunters have brought in their limit and others have experienced little trouble in bagging one bird a day. Of course, many of the inexperienced pheasant hunters, as well as those who have had "tough luck," regard the season which closes at sunset, October 31 as a "bum" one with a scarcity of game.

Quail are also reported as plentiful.

FOUNDATION TELLS PROFESSIONALISM IN COLLEGE SPORT

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—(AP)—The Carnegie foundation for the advancement of teaching makes 14 salient charges against college athletics, which may be summarized as follows:

One-seventh of all athletes and from 25 to 50 per cent of football players are subsidized.

Recruiting has advanced to a point where school stars hawk their services.

Commercialization has caused abandonment of the game for the sake of money.

Exaggerated athletic emphasis has diverted many institutions from intellectual development.

Many officials are guilty of evading regulations regarding recruiting.

Press exploitation has brought "demoralizing publicity."

Too much attention is given the general public's whims in schedules.

Only 28 of 112 colleges were not engaged in recruiting.

High school athletes are burned out before college days by "pressure."

Alumni inveigle stars into college.

Coaches are too busy to teach sportsmanship.

Relations have been severed in many instances where preventable.

Recruiting and subsidization have disgusted many alumni.

College heads have evaded responsibility for commercialization.

FINE WEATHER TO HOLD IS FORECAST

One of the finest fall seasons in the valley's history continues to delight the people, with comparatively cold nights and very warm, sunshiny days, and no weather change is yet in sight, the forecast for tomorrow being of the somewhat monotonous "fair tonight and tomorrow" kind.

The temperature jumped two degrees yesterday to a maximum of 52, followed by a minimum this morning of 35 turning into another warm day for this time of year. The average maximum temperature for the past nine days, according to the official figures of the local weather station, has been 74 degrees.

The only blot on this fine weather is that there has been a smoke haze throughout the valley the past two days, caused by smoke drifting in from forest fires burning in other sections, as there had been no forest fires reported in the Crater national forest territory for days past until word came last night that a small fire was burning in the woods the other side of Butte Falls. No word had yet been received from this fire up to early this afternoon at the Crater national forest headquarters here, but it is known that the smoke from it has not reached the valley.

The smoke haze in the air here is not caused by burning of slashings throughout the county, as it is too dry to burn slashings.
