RADICAL LEADER ASKED TO FORM FRENCH CABINET

PARIS, Oct. 25.—(P)—Edouard Daladier, radical leader, today accepted President Doumergue's invitation to form a new government to succeed that of Premier Aristide Briand, who resigned Tuesday. He told the president he would try to get a cabinet together. M. Daladier spent three-quarters of an hour with the president, discussing his plans. He left early in the afternoon for Rheims, where he expected to consult other leaders. He promised the president to tell him Saturday at 3 p. m. whether he considered it possible to form a government. M. Daladier has frequently held posts in cabinets during the past ten years but has never been premier. In 1924 he was minister of the colonies and in 1925 became minister of war in the Painleve cabinet.

SAFeway STORES IS NEW NAME

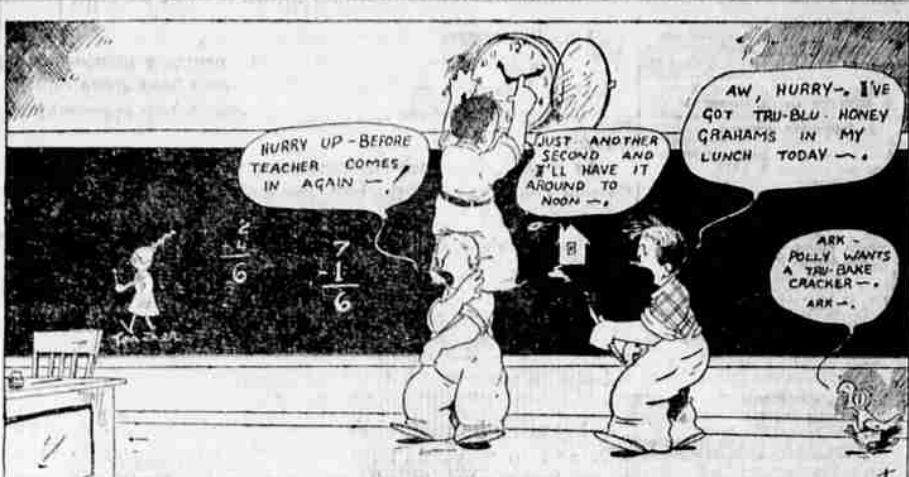
Announcement was made today of a change of name of Skaggs-Safeway stores in this city to "Safeway Stores," dropping the name "Skaggs." This change is said to be in harmony with the general policy of the company operating the local store to convert all of their stores to Safeway Stores immediately. The reason given for the name being changed is the desire to simplify the name and make it one which will be uniform throughout the country. Officers of the company stated that it was felt a coined name was better to be used for their stores than that of an individual for many reasons. In making the change, however, officials took pains to emphasize that the stores formerly known as "Skaggs-Safeway Stores" will continue to be owned and operated by the same people and in the same manner as heretofore. M. B. Skaggs, who founded them, continues in exactly the same relationship to the organization that he has always occupied and his brothers are associated with him in the same manner. The only change that has taken place is that of the name and there has been no change in policy or ownership.
