

'FROZEN JUSTICE' THRILLING STORY OF ESKIMO MAID

'Frozen Justice,' a melodramatic talking film story of a half-cast Eskimo girl, starring Lenore Ulrich, well known actress of the legitimate stage in her first talking film, a news review and a very laughable short talking comedy, 'Man o' War,' is the pleasing bill which opened at the Craterian theater yesterday, to run afternoon and night daily until Sunday. Features of the news review are pictures of Connie Mack, manager of the world champion Athletics, and his two aides, Eddie Collins and Kid Gleason, and of the 'Cubs' stars, and a song by three of the Cub players.

'Frozen Justice' tells the story of the longing of the half-breed girl—her father a white man and her mother an Eskimo—for the wonders of her father's world of white people, and its portrayal by an excellent supporting company, brings out the dramatic gifts of Miss Ulrich, Robert Haupt, Robert Frazer and the broken-nosed Louis Wolheim, and some more of the humor of El Brendel, who was last seen here as the Swede in 'The Cockeyed World.'

Although Miss Ulrich shows herself as a finished and very likable actress on the talking screen, as well as on the stage, she is more pleasing and convincing in the latter part of the picture as the pretty dance hall girl in the home than as the attractive young wife of the Eskimo chief in the first part.

Much artistry is shown in portraying the scenes of the frozen north with its fields of ice, treacherous avalanches and dances and songs by the natives to their sun gods, and giving glimpses of home life in the igloos. The scenes in the Nome streets, bars and dance halls during the gold rush, when the 'social life' was one continuous whoopee affair, are also very entertaining.

Especially picturesque and awe-inspiring are the scenes in this frozen drama of the north, of the ice floes crushing in the traders' ship, the awful death of the villain later on when great walls of snow and ice close in on him. A couple of murders and several fights furnish some of the other thrills.

While 'Frozen Justice' is not exactly a Sunday school drama, it is not very conspicuous as an unclean one, and anyone going to witness 'Frozen Justice,' expecting to see and hear something especially rich and racy, will probably be disappointed, but well entertained. R. A. K.

KLAMATH NEUTRAL IN CAVES ROAD PROJECT, GRANTS PASS IS TOLD

Several Grants Pass officials were in Klamath Falls Tuesday noon to meet with directors of the Klamath chamber of commerce in regard to the proposed Williams Creek-Oregon Cave highway, which is being endorsed by the Medford chamber of commerce.

The question was discussed, but no action was taken inasmuch as the directors took the stand that the question is one to be decided by the cities directly affected by the road.

Medford contends that the road will cut off a distance of 20 miles between Medford and the caves, and Grants Pass people state the road will be a duplication and is unnecessary.

BROKER COOKE TO PRISON FLAX JOB

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 25.—(AP)—State prison officials said today that James P. Cooke, former president of the defunct brokerage firm of Overbeck & Cooke, Portland, who arrived at the penitentiary Monday to begin a seven-year sentence for embezzlement, would probably be assigned to work in the flax plant until there is an opening in clerical employment.

Cooke arrived here in company with his two sons, Dr. Ralph Fisher and B. Heitkemper. He was silent as he was "dressed in" and assigned to a "fish cell." He will be photographed and his Bertillon and finger-print records will be made.

Under the imprisonment laws, Cooke, assuming that he receives good time credit, will be eligible for parole after 28 months.

OREGON SOLON FACES 12 MONTHS IN JAIL

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 25.—(AP)—Charles R. LaFollette, state legislator from Washington county, faced another six months' jail sentence today in addition to the six months' term already hanging over his head after Circuit Judge Tucker found him guilty of contempt proceedings.

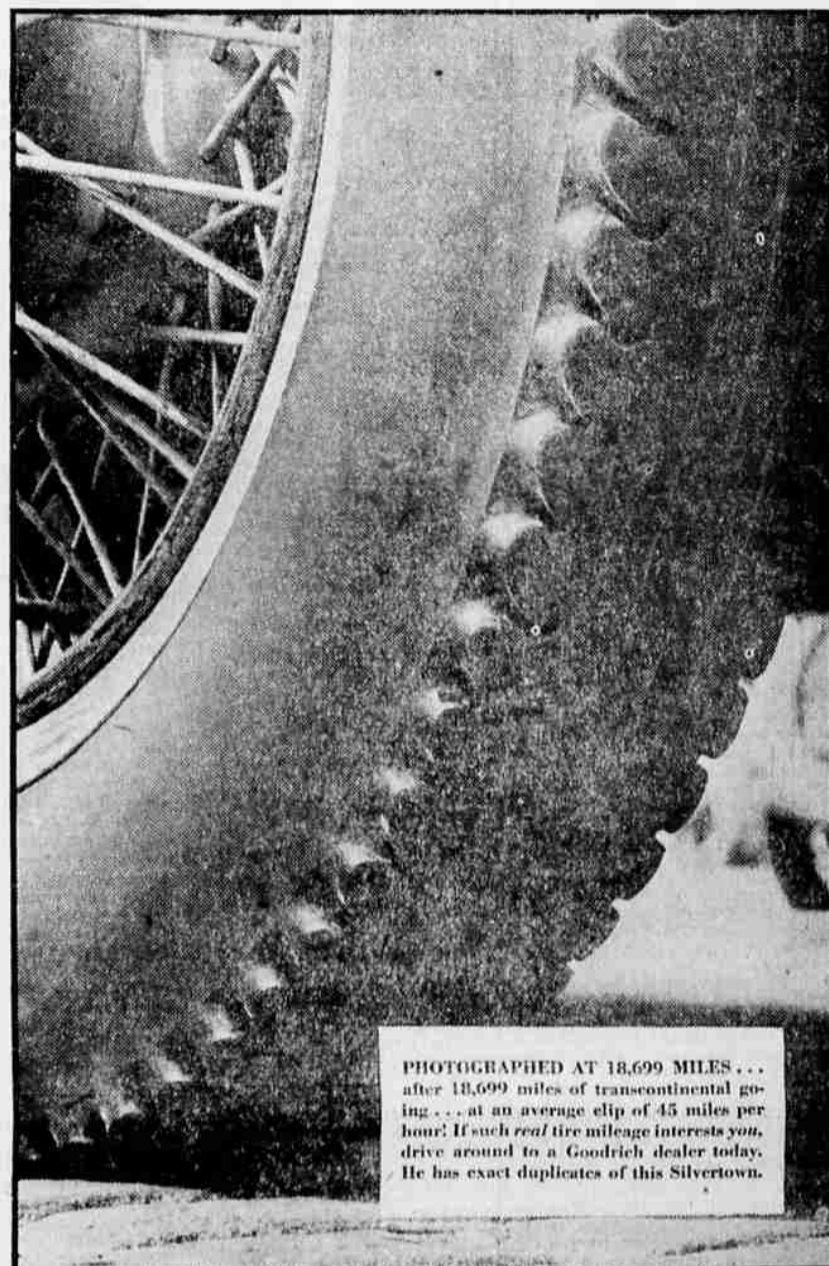
