

CONKLE LEAVES FOR HEARING ON INELIGIBILITY

State High School Athletic Assn. to Sift Charges Against Baker Football Players — Landreth Relinquishes Place.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 25.—(AP) Harold G. Bronson of Milton Free-water was appointed today to act for Austin Landreth on the Oregon State High School Athletic association board of control when it meets here tomorrow to sift charges of ineligibility by La Grande and Corvallis high schools against five Baker football players.

A protest against Landreth acting as member of the board of which he is chairman was received yesterday by Roy E. Cannon, secretary of the state board of control. The board consisting of Landreth, Cannon and H. H. Conkle, Medford, was called upon by Cannon to meet with representatives of Baker, La Grande and Corvallis high schools to investigate the charges. In answer to Baker's protest against Landreth acting on the board, the board selected Bronson.

H. W. Adams of the Corvallis high school declared in a report received at Cannon's office that two of the players under protest, Clayton Crawford and Harold Joslin were from Corvallis and probably been solicited.

Principal B. H. Conkle of the local high school will leave by train for Portland this evening to attend the session of the state athletic board of control, called for Saturday morning at 10 o'clock by Secretary Roy E. Cannon to consider the protests against Baker high school, the most sensational charges of rules violation that has occurred in the state for several seasons.

The specific charge filed by Principal E. D. Towler of La Grande is that Baker has recruited players from towns scattered from California to Idaho.

The particular players mentioned in the protest, and the towns from which it is alleged they were recruited are: Melvin Eilers, Canby, Ore.; Carroll Smith, Twin Falls, Idaho; Clayton Crawford, Corvallis; Harold Joslin, Spokane; and Clarence Webber, Burbank, Calif.

In answer to these charges, Principal E. D. Walker of Baker, has filed proof with the athletic board, that all the players protested are legal residents of Baker, and thus eligible to play.

Cite Clause
The particular clause in the State Athletic association rules involved reads: "A student coming from any other district (except one who shall have completed entire course in his own high school) shall not be eligible to represent his school until he has earned at least one semester's credits in the school entered, unless his parents or legal guardians (determined by certified copies of court records), are bona fide residents of the school district in which the school is located."

The Baker officials claim that this clause has been complied with inasmuch as all the protested players have legal guardians living in Baker.

The board of control, of which Principal B. H. Conkle is a member, has advised the athletic board the question and enforce its decision on the school concerned.

OREGON LINEUP SKY 3 REGULAR MEN SATURDAY

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 25.—(AP)—The University of Oregon football team, due here today from Eugene, Ore., will probably be without three of its regulars when it meets the University of Washington eleven Saturday.

George Stadelman, giant center, broke his ankle in the Oregon-Idaho game last week and remained in Eugene. He will be out for the remainder of the season. Bobby Robinson, halfback, and Austin Colbert, tackle, also were injured and may not see action against the Huskies.

The likely starting lineup will include Eric Forsta, at center; Irving Schulz, instead of Colbert, at left tackle, and Al Browne, instead of Robinson, at left half. Forsta, Schulz and Browne are all sophomores. With Erdley at left end and Moeller at fullback, who also are sophomores, the Webfoot team is comparatively green. Captain Mason is the only player to have had two years' experience.

PALO ALTO HAS HEADLINE GAME COAST GRIDIRON

Trojan-Stanford Tilt Saturday to Attract Capacity Throng—O. S. C. vs. Vandals and Webfoots vs. Huskies On Menu.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—(AP) The giant Pacific coast gridiron, Southern California and Stanford, will meet in Palo Alto tomorrow in the most important game to be played in the west this far this year.

Two other conference engagements are on tomorrow's bill of fare, as well as four non-conference clashes, but they fade into a second rate position before the battle at Palo Alto.

The Trojans left Los Angeles last night for Palo Alto and the Stanford squad moved out to a secluded country club to get away from vociferous well-wishers. Every seat in the stadium, over 88,000, was sold out last Wednesday, and tomorrow's battle will mark the first time in Cardinal history that the big bowl has been filled to capacity for a mid-season game. Fifteen thousand fans from the southland began their northward trek today.

The two teams are tied for the leadership of the conference and the winner of tomorrow's battle will be on the inside track leading to the gridiron championship of the west.

O. S. C. vs. Vandals.
The other two conference games are to be played in the northwest. At Corvallis, Oregon State College runs up against the Idaho Vandals, with the result of the game pretty much of a tossup. At Seattle, the Universities of Washington and Oregon will meet in an interstate battle.

Leading the list of non-conference encounters is the game at Berkeley between the University of California and the Olympic club. The Bears returned home Wednesday from a successful mid-season eastern invasion, and will take on the clubmen tomorrow in a preliminary to their important contest with Southern California next week.

Contests between Washington State and Willamette at Pullman; U. C. L. A. and Pomona at Los Angeles, and Montana and Montana State at Butte, round out the day's activities of the conference teams.

YALE ARMY GAME TOPS INTEREST OF EASTERN FANDOM

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—(AP)—It is no new thing for Yale, Harvard and Princeton to enter an October game in the role of underdog. All three will be in the role tomorrow. Some 120,000 enthusiasts will be present at Soldiers' field, the Yale and Palmer stadium. The Yale-Army game at New Haven tops the card for sectional and general interest, but the meeting of Dartmouth and Harvard at Cambridge will command attention, both because of its historic background and because Harvard will be fighting to keep its head above water, the last remaining undefeated members of the big three.

A twice-defeated Princeton eleven faces its last chance to save something from its eastern preliminary season, but all the odds rest with Hill Ingram's fine Navy team. Yale will deploy against the cadets in the Yale bowl with the slashing Warner offense only half mastered and depending upon an air attack to turn in a possible upset. Even with Ben Ticker absent from his post at center, Harvard will present a favored Dartmouth eleven far more of a problem than Columbia was able to offer last week.

Carnegie Tech will attempt to make it three straight over a great Notre Dame eleven at Pittsburgh, with the Irish favored to break their Scotch jinx.
