HEAVY TONE CONTINUES IN MARKET

Added Selling Takes Prices Lower in Short Session—Assurance By Leaders Aids in Quelling Panic—Overburdened Traders Seek Peace By Dropping Burdens.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Secretary Lamont said today he had decided a proposed radio address by himself to help sustain public confidence in the business situation was unnecessary.

NEW YORK, Oct. 26.—(AP)—A further backwash of selling carried prices moderately lower at a comparatively quiet session today. The ticker fell only about 20 minutes behind the market, in contrast to the delay of hours on Thursday, and considerably more than an hour yesterday.

The great accumulation of reassuring statements by leaders of business and finance as to the fundamental soundness of conditions, capped last night by a statement by President Hoover, had tended to quiet the market considerably, but many traders who had suffered a severe nervous strain while hanging on to their stocks during the week had lost their appetite for speculation and decided to unburden themselves of their holdings and have a peaceful week end.

General Electric was depressed nearly 10 points, and such shares as Westinghouse Electric, Johnsonville, Simmons and Columbian Carbon about 6 to 9. American Can, American and Foreign Power, Eastman Kodak, Macy, Columbia Gas and Ladium Steel lost 3 to 5 points.

U. S. Steel sagged a little, but again fluctuated in an extremely narrow range, indicating strong efforts at stabilizing it around the current level. A few shares reached new lows, Hupp sagged to 29.

Total sales approximated 2,100,000 shares and the closing tone was distinctly heavy.

COOKE BROTHERS HOOPER ISSUES SPENT FUNDS ON ILLEGIT LIQUOR ON BIRTH DATE

Trustee in Bankruptcy Seeks Recover \$27,729 Squandered by Officers of Portland Firm for Personal Drink.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 26.—(AP)—J. G. Gillingham, trustee in bankruptcy for the defunct brokerage firm of Overbeck and Cooke, filed an amended complaint in circuit court today seeking the recovery of \$27,729 from Frank Hochfield, professional bondsman, alleged to have been paid for liquor unlawfully delivered to officers of the firm.

At the same time amended complaints seeking judgment for an aggregate of \$57,830.24 from three defendants also were filed.

The liquor deliveries, according to the complaint, were made between November 1, 1923 and December 1, 1927. The original action was for \$821,253, which was alleged, Hochfield owed the firm on money advanced in the purchase of stocks between May, 1926 and December, 1927.

The complaint sets forth that Hochfield had made the liquor deliveries in violation of the law for the personal use of the officers and not for "any lawful corporate purpose."

TEXAS CULT ORDERS MEMBER COMMIT SUICIDE BECAUSE OF LOVE TRIANGLE

EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Strapped to an operating table, James Clifford, 28-year-old self-styled seer of a wealthy Oakland, Calif. family, declared today he shot himself on orders of a secret cult, whose heads gave him a pistol and demanded he commit suicide because he had fallen in love with the wife of another cult member.

LAKE CREW MAROONED ON ISLAND

Captain and Thirty Men of Lake Superior Freighter Huddled On Small Islet Without Food or Shelter in Storm—One Member Carries Report to Quebec Harbor.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Oct. 26.—(AP)—The cold northern dawn spreading over the white-capped waves of Lake Superior today found Captain P. C. Farrell of the Package Freighter Chicago and 29 members of his crew huddled about their camp fires on the rocky shore at the western end of Michipicoten island, where they have been marooned without food or shelter since Tuesday night.

Michipicoten is a wooded and mountainous island, 100 miles northwest of Sault Ste Marie. Its highest rocks rise a thousand feet above lake level. The only inhabitants are a few Indian fishermen living at Juebec harbor in the southeastern part of the island.

One member of the crew of the Chicago succeeded in making his way across the nine miles of desolate coast to Quebec harbor last night and reported that other members of the crew might attempt to get across today.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Four bodies found late last night in a water-filled life boat, several miles off St. Joseph, Mich., spurred coast guardmen to an intensive search today for the remaining 43 bodies of the crew of the freighter "Milwaukee," which sank in Tuesday's storm.

The four bodies brought the total thus far recovered to nine. Two of those found last night were washed to seats in the lifeboat, which was guano deep in water and bore the name "Milwaukee."

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 26.—(AP)—The tumultuous waters of Lake Michigan which eliminated the Milwaukee from the shipping lists of the Great Lakes yielded up the story of another tragedy this week.

Out of the lake have come bits of wreckage of the House of David schooner Rosabelle, unreported since it set out for a cruise eight years ago. The Rosabelle carried a crew of 11 men and was on its way from high island with a cargo of potatoes raised there, when it disappeared in a storm. Wreckage of the vessel was found on the beach near Racine, Wis., by searchers for a trace of the Milwaukee.

CHICAGO, Oct. 26.—(AP)—A \$100,000,000 fund today was placed at the disposal of the American wheat farmer, to be loaned out by the federal farm board through the newly organized Farmers' National Grain corporation.

BINGHAM IS PLAYED IN LOBBY QUIZ

Relations Between Senator and Manufacturing Assn. Condemned By Chairman Caraway—Transaction Beneath Dignity of Senate Is Assertion in Report to Solons.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26.—(AP)—The relations between Senator Bingham, Republican, Connecticut and the Connecticut Manufacturers' association were condemned before the senate today by Chairman Caraway of the lobby committee, as "tending to shake the confidence of the American public in the integrity of legislation."

Caraway made his statement after presenting a report to the senate from the committee detailing circumstances of the "loan" by the Connecticut Manufacturers' association of Charles L. Eyanston to assist Senator Bingham in his work on the finance committee in framing the tariff bill.

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
