"Is that not one secret of contentment?" asked "Bill" Dollar. "Why not let us develop our vast resources for neighborliness, for friendship and cooperation right here in our own community. If community spirit will increase land values as it did for Pete, of the story, it will also increase the happiness and well-being of our greatest crop—the boys and girls."

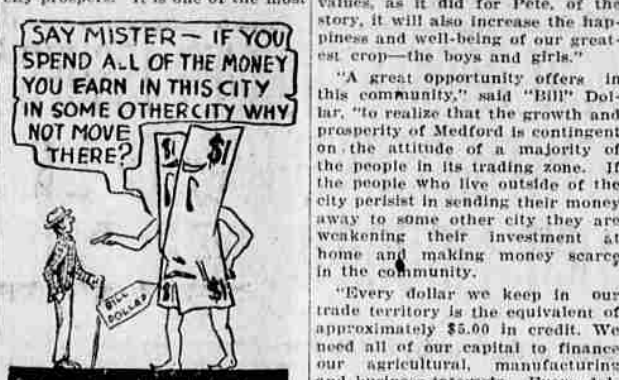
"A great opportunity offers in this community," said "Bill" Dollar, "to realize that the growth and prosperity of Medford is contingent on the attitude of a majority of the people in its trading zone. If the people who live outside of the city persist in sending their money away to some other city they are weakening their investment at home and making money scarce in the community.

"Every dollar we keep in our trade territory is the equivalent of approximately \$5.00 in credit. We need all of our capital to finance our agricultural, manufacturing and business interests. Every dollar sent away by a business man or a farmer to some other city for goods that can be bought in Medford means \$5.00 in credit taken from the community.

"Every farmer who buys merchandise, clothes or his farm requirements in other cities is sending cash, and also credit, from his own community. Every merchant who buys goods from distant markets when they can be bought in this state is reducing the trading capital of this territory," said "Bill" Dollar.

"When let us be true to this community. Let the city dweller and the farmer pool their interests for a permanent prosperity. Cooperation has built every town since the landing of the Pilgrims and it will build Medford bigger when they both learn that one cannot fail without the other goes down, too."
