

OREGON ELEVEN FAVORED TO WIN IN WASHINGTON

Husky Out to 'Turn Table' On Webfoots for 20 to 7 Defeat of Last Year — Three Oregonian Regulars On Injured List.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 26.—(AP)—VIRTUALLY their last chance for a Pacific coast victory this season, the University of Washington Huskies were out today to "turn the tables" on the University of Oregon eleven. Last year the Washington team journeyed into Oregon an overwhelming favorite to defeat the Webfoots but the Huskies were smothered under a surprising 20-7 score. Yesterday the Oregon eleven came to Seattle a big favorite to trounce Washington, which has lost its first three starts this season.

Faced with stern necessity of winning, the Husky players were expected to make it at least interesting for the Webfoots. Although Coach Enochshaw resigned, effective last Wednesday, he offered to remain in the coaching position until the end of the 1929 season.

The Oregon team came to Seattle with three of its regulars on the injured list. George Stadelman, stellar center, was left at home with a broken ankle. Jerry Robinson, negro halfback, and Austin Colbert, tackle, were hurt last week and it was improbable that they should see action today. Despite this fact the Oregonians were a heavy favorite to win the battle.

New Combination
Coach Huskies has experimented with several different backfields this year with little success and planned to send still another combination against Oregon. The starters today were expected to be Mittelstedt, quarterback; Merle Hufford and Chuck Rosenhan, halfbacks; and Bill Marsh, fullback. This was to be Rosenhan's first starting lineup. CALIFORNIANS TAKE FIELD IN COAST CLASSIC

Trojans Boast Strongest Eleven in History of School—Stanford Lineup Recovered Excepting Pete Heiser.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 26.—(AP) With what has been called the strongest southern California eleven in the history of the university, and before a crowd of 89,000 enthusiastic fans, Coach Howard Jones' Trojans were here to meet Stanford today in their annual battle which this year will virtually eliminate one or the other from the championship race.

Stanford faced the invaders with only one regular on the injured list, half a dozen others having recovered from a bad knee epidemic that struck the Warner squad early this season. Pete Heiser, first string guard, will view the proceedings from the bench, his place being taken by Ray Dawson.

Southern California pinned her hopes for victory on the powerful and speedy running attack that has enabled her to score 299 points already this season, plus a line that averages 196 pounds from end to end.
