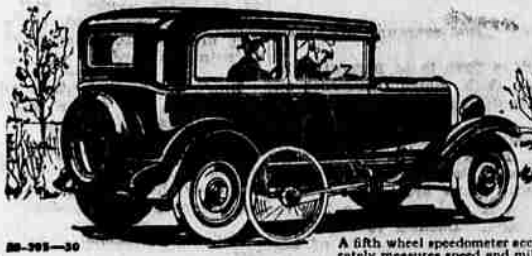

VANCOUVER, B. GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 26.—(P)—Formation of a port district to include all of Del Norte county, California, has been perfected at a conference held in Crescent City in which city and county officials from Grants Pass participated.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 26.—(P)—Western Dairy Products Company and California Dairies reported a net profit for the three quarters of \$1,277,000 after usual charges. The gain over the similar period of 1928 is more than \$250,000.

EUGENE.—Clinton Hurd, county commissioner, announced that all right of way on the Siuslaw Highway between Rain Rock and Cushman had been obtained or arranged for.

EUGENE.—Lawrence T. Harris, former justice of the Oregon supreme court, who underwent an operation in Portland, is improving at his home here.

SANDY.—A live kangaroo mouse was captured by John Maroney, highway maintenance man, and turned over to the high school for observation.

SALEM.—Fire which started from an automobile caused \$5000 damage to the Salem Hardware company store.

ROSEBURG.—An inquest into the death of Stewart J. Bezgs, Newberg, Ore., who died in a hospital after a shot fired from an ambush struck him while he was hunting, was ordered.

NEWPORT.—A body believed to have been Art Robinson, fisherman, drowned when the craft Rustler capsized, was washed up on the beach here.

HAVANA.—Too many doctors and lawyers in Cuba against the small percentage of skilled industrial workers, has led the government to open technical schools in Havana and Oriente province. The first manual arts school has already started in Oriente province.

Guiding Your Child

Every parent cherishes a mental picture of an ideal child. Such a child would conform with the physical, mental and social standards set for his age. He would be adaptable, sociable and considerate of others, and yet self-controlled and independent.

As soon as baby hands show the faintest impulse toward trying to touch or seize things, one should make sure that plenty of suitable articles are at hand for them to experiment with.

Correct walking requires a free elastic movement of the back muscles and those of the diaphragm. The chest should be held firm, held easily poised and the body lifted from the hips. The weight should always be carried forward and over the moving base, the feet pointed straight ahead and the legs swinging freely from the hips.
