Tracing the place that advance study and research have had in the progressive movements in the world, the Oregon executive made a strong plea for the sympathetic support of the research worker in every field. That Benjamin Franklin, who "laid the foundation for modern science," was an ardent research student, and that the largest manufacturing corporations in the United States today maintain their staff of research workers, bent upon the development of programs to be put into effect several years from now, were among the striking statements made by Mr. Hall.
